Taking his own sweet time as usual, Delany won the featured mile in 4:10.4 in the Cleveland K of C meet Friday night to complete his second unbeaten season on the indoor circuit. It was the 15th straight indoor mile victory for the Olympic 1,500 meter champion.

Phillies Need High Class Shortstop To Be Contender

(This is the fifth in a series on the 1957 prospects of the major league clubs.)

Clearwater, Fla. — (U.P.) — Unless they come up with a high class shortstop, the Philadelphia Phillies appear doomed to another second division finish.

Manager Mayo Smith feels he has championship pitching, but admits he has "a glaring weakness at shortstop and we might have a gap in right field, too."

However, he doesn't agree with those who feel the Phillies lost power when they traded Del Ennis to the Cardinals for Rip Repulski.

"Rip hits the long ball, too, and don't let his last year's figure fool you," Smith said. "Also, he strengthens our defense."

Repulski out-hit Ennis 277 to 269 last season but had only 53 RBIs to Ennis' 95.

In Robin Roberts, who failed to win 20 games last year for the first time in seven years, and southpaw Curt Simmons and Harvey Haddix, the Phillies figure they have the best three starting pitchers in the league.

Jack Meyer was a disappointment last season when he won only seven while losing 11, but baseball men figure he has the potential to get into the select 20-game circle. He could give the Phillies the best starting four in the league.

Smith also is high on the prospects of Jack Sanford, who got out of service last year, and believes Jim Hearn, the ex-Giant, can help in spot starting roles.

Holdovers Bob Miller (3-6), Saul Rogovin (7-6) and Ron Neasey (2-3) also probably will remain.

Smith wouldn't trade his catcher, Stan Lopata, for any other in the league and declares that Lopata will only catch this year and will not be used at first base. Behind Lopata he has Mack Burk and Joe Lonnett.

The only infield post with which Smith is satisfied is third base where Willie Jones holds forth.

Rookie Ed Bouchee, who hit .294 at Miami last year with 94 RBIs, will be given every chance to win the first base job in order to free Marv Blaylock for the right field post if necessary.

At second, Ted Kazanski, another bonus player who can field but lacks power, probably will get the nod over the veteran Solly Hemus. Unless the Phillies deal for a shortstop, it will be either Bobby Morgan or Roy

Dons 3rd In NCAA; Down Michigan St.

Kansas City, Mo. — (U.P.) — San Francisco, two-time national champions, salvaged third place in the NCAA championships Saturday night by downing Michigan State 67-60 in a ragged game.

North Carolina, the nation's No. 1 team, met Kansas, second ranked, for the championship.

San Francisco and Michigan State battled on nearly even terms most of the way the Dons leading for the last 16 1/2 minutes by margins of two to nine points. The Dons, ahead 33-30 at the half, gave up the lead only momentarily in the second half and were in command to stay after John Green, Michigan State's agile 6-5 sophomore center, fouled out with 15:25 to go.

Gene Brown, the Dons' veteran forward, led the second half surge and was the game's high scorer with 22 points. Mike Farmer added 16 for San Francisco and Art Day got 12.

Bill Approved for Termination Delay

Washington — (U.P.) — A Senate bill calling for delay in termination of federal control over the Klamath Indians was approved with some amendments Friday by the House Indian Affairs Subcommittee.

Federal control over the Klamaths has been scheduled to end in 1958.

Main provision of the bill—to postpone any land sales from the reservation until the end of the 1958 congressional session—was left intact, Rep. Al Ullman (D-Ore.) said.

Ullman said the bill cleared the subcommittee by an 8 to 2 vote after an amendment had been added which set the date for federal control to end as August, 1960, rather than August, 1961, as the Senate bill had proposed.

Also changed in the House subcommittee version was the stipulation that the federal government reimburse the Indians on a matching basis up to \$550,000 for the costs of termination. The Senate had proposed reimbursement up to \$1.1 million without requiring matching payments.

Angels Must Go Long Way To Beat 1956 Title Team

(Following is another in the series of stories covering the Pacific Coast league spring training camps.)

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — The Los Angeles Angels are still in the Pacific Coast league despite all the talk of major league baseball and the parent Brooklyn Dodgers are determined to field a strong team for their new affiliate.

But the Brooklyn-owned Angels will have to go a long way to beat last year's team which coasted to the pennant and sent a dozen players up to the Cubs for this season.

Still, the Angels have big Steve Bilko whose potent bat was responsible for 55 homers and won him the "most valuable player award." With Bilko's stick the Angels will be dangerous again, says new manager Clay Bryant who was installed by the Dodgers to run the club.

"I can't say we will top last year when Los Angeles won the pennant so decisively," says Bryant, "but we'll be shooting for the top spot with a well-balanced lineup."

"We're counting on Brooklyn for some help. I would say about five players of the caliber of this league would be what we needed."

Needed Spark
Bryant says if Bilko comes anywhere close to last year's performance he would be the spark the team needs to have a successful year.

Perhaps the most urgent need of the Los Angeles club is a top-notch catcher. Elvin Tappe is back and John Roseboro was acquired in the swap of players with Portland when Brooklyn took over Los Angeles. But Roseboro is training at Vero Beach and there are indications the Dodgers may keep him.

The outfield also is lacking in reserves with only three men listed on the roster at the moment. They are the veteran former Giant-Cubs player Monte Irvin, Bob Coats from last year's Angel squad and Bob Borkowski, acquired from Portland—all good men but not enough of them.

On the mound the Angels would be somewhat close to requirements if Brooklyn did not keep Rene Valdes, 22-game winner at Portland. But he is training with the Dodgers and may not be back. Gone are the stal-

Free Throw Rule Changed

Kansas City, Mo. — (U.P.) — College basketball coaches ended their 31st annual convention Saturday with the decision to make only one major rules change recommendation, that on free throws.

The coaches, some 450 to 500 strong, decided Thursday to recommend the rules change on free throws in line with what was used in the Big Ten conference this season.

The "six-foul" rule does away with the "one and one" bonus free throw for the first six personal fouls called on each team each half. The rule, and several other minor ones, will be recommended to the national rules committee which opens a two-day meeting here today.
