Salt Lake Men Held On Bogus Money Deal

Minneapolis—(U.P.)—Two Salt Lake City men seized by police at a motel here with "hundreds of thousands" of dollars in counterfeit money, today started telling Secret Service agents where they got the bogus bills.

Arrested Tuesday night by Minneapolis police were Max G. Christensen, 30, and Edward L. Montoro, 21.

Frederic Strout, special Secret Service agent in charge of the investigation, said the men had up to \$800,000 in bogus \$20 bills when they were nabbed.

Some 87 bundles of bills were found stuffed under the back seat of their car.

The firm has received several reports from customers who said they dialed the Capitol from out of town and ended up talking to an irate Anaheim housewife who said she was "sick and tired" of getting calls destined for the Capitol.

The Capitol number, Jackson 7-6341, is the same as Mrs. Joan Hueth's number. Mrs. Hueth said she received a half dozen of the calls during the past two weeks.
