U.S. Expected to Offer \$75 Million in Aid to Poland

Government Sought \$300 Million

Washington — (U.P.) — The United States is expected to offer Communist Poland some \$75 million worth of economic aid, it was disclosed Saturday.

Administration officials said an aid program of this approximate size is up for final study by President Eisenhower and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles. An announcement of the American offer may be made next week.

Such an offer would be only a fraction of the \$300 million in aid the Polish government sought in talks which began here Feb. 26.

Poland, which has been seeking to loosen its ties with Moscow, wanted approximately \$100 million worth of mining and agricultural machinery, about \$200 million more in cotton, and more than a million tons of food grains. The Polish shopping list includes wheat, corn, barley, rye, fats and oils.

U.S. officials were overwhelmed by the amount of aid Poland sought, and pointed out early in the negotiations that the \$300 million bid just could not be met.

Poland would pay, in one way or another, for all the \$75 million in aid it receives.

As it now shapes up, the \$75 million project would be started in carefully-controlled phases. This would allow the United States to cut off the program quickly if the Polish Communist regime moved closer to Moscow.

American officials believe the program would provide enough aid, as a starter, to let Poland's 20 million people know there is hope for them if they tighten their ties with the West and remain aloof from the Soviet line.

There is some doubt whether Poland will accept the \$75 million aid proposal.

Any American aid offer is sure to run into some congressional opposition. Senate Minority Leader William F. Knowland (R-Calif.), is opposed to aid. But several Democratic senators and Rep. Thomas S. Gordon, (D-Ill.), chairman of the House Foreign Affairs committee have come out in favor of aid to Poland.

Thirty-five dollars in currency and miscellaneous women's clothing valued at \$300 were reported taken Friday in a burglary at an apartment occupied by Mrs. Margaret Emma Riley, 217 South Riverside ave., Medford.

After ransacking the kitchen and living room, the burglar took the money, which had been placed in a jewel box, and the clothing, and left through the front door of the apartment, police said.

Investigation by officers is still in progress.

River Basin Compact Ready For Governor

Salem — (U.P.) — The Klamath river basin compact with California was ready for the consideration of Gov. Robert D. Holmes Saturday after the House passed it Friday with only one dissenting vote.

Final action on the compact was delayed pending an investigation by the Judiciary committee of changes in administrative procedures that should be made in the compact.

However, Rep. Robert Duncan, Medford Democrat, said his committee felt it would be too complicated to confer with California and make the changes suggested. The bill passed unchanged.

Similar legislation is now in the California House after passage by that state's Senate.

Duncan said it was of major importance to get the compact into law to assure that water from the Klamath basin was not diverted into the central valley of California.

Duncan added that the compact would validate all claims on the basin's water for domestic use, irrigation, recreation, hydroelectric and industrial uses.

Water Stays in Basin

Specifically, the compact provides that waters diverted from the Klamath river within the upper Klamath river basin for use in California shall not be taken outside the Upper Klamath river basin.

Objections that delayed passage of the compact centered on whether the Klamath River Basin commission should have limited rule-making power and should not be suable. Both provisions are in the compact.

Duncan said that if any section of the compact was declared unconstitutional, it would not affect other sections of the compact not involved in the dispute.

Rep. Robert Bennett, Portland Republican, said that the unlimited rule-making power given the commission was probably unconstitutional. He voted against passage.

Duncan agreed, but stated that if unlimited rule-making was declared unconstitutional, it would only affect the pollution program and not the major water agreement which is the heart of the compact.

He added that if the Congress approves the compact it will give some precedent to the contention that states have the right to determine the uses to which they will put their water.

Local Man Killed In Auto Accident

Fay E. Diamond, 62, of 723 Sherman st., Medford, was killed and another Medford resident was injured about 10:26 a.m. Friday when their car overturned on U. S. Highway 100 about 23 miles northeast of Crescent City, Calif.

Injured was Raleigh C. Wyatt, 71, Medford, who was taken by ambulance to Seaside hospital at Crescent City. Wyatt suffered a broken leg, according to California officials.

California state police said the accident occurred when Wyatt, driver of a station wagon pulling a trailer, swerved to avoid a rock which fell on the highway as a large truck approached the station wagon.

The vehicle, which was traveling about 35 miles per hour, crashed into a bank before it turned over, police said. Impact from the crash knocked the vehicle's engine into the front seat, they added. The two men were en route to Crescent City on a fishing trip, according to reports.

Diamond's body is being returned to Medford for services and interment. Conger-Morris Funeral home is in charge of arrangements.

Mrs. Thora Lawrence Roberts, for many years a Medford school teacher and administrator, and later a jewelry store proprietor here, died at her home Friday afternoon. She was 77.

Funeral services will be held at Conger-Morris Funeral home at 10 a.m. Monday, with the Rev. George R. V. Bolster, of St. Mark's Episcopal church, officiating. Committal will follow in the IOOF cemetery.

Pallbearers will include Victor Sether, Ben Trowbridge, Tod Tibbitt, Otto Frohmayer, H. D. Christensen and Bert Lageson. Honorary pallbearers will be E. H. Hedrick, Leland Brophy, J. C. Collins, and George Grabow.

Mrs. Roberts was born in Kingston, Tenn., on Jan. 20, 1880. At the age of six, she came to Phoenix, Ore. with her parents the late William H. and Elizabeth Pickle Smith, and later attended what was then Ashland Normal school (now Southern Oregon college), graduating in 1906.

As a teacher, she went to Alaska and taught for four years, returning to Oregon in 1914, enrolling at the University of Oregon, from which she graduated. Returning to Medford she taught for many years in both grade and high schools, retiring from teaching in 1928 as principal of Jackson school.

That same year she was married in Tucson, Ariz., to John F. Lawrence. He preceded her in death in 1944, and until 1952, when she sold the Lawrence Jewelry store, she operated the establishment.

On April 25, 1950, she was married to Dr. Frank Roberts of Medford, who survives. They have made their home at 2218 East Main st.

She was an active worker in St. Mark's Episcopal church for a number of years, and belonged to the Zonta, Eastern Star, Daughters of the Nile, Zulemia Temple; American Association of University Women, and the League of Women Voters.

Survivors beside her husband include a brother, Justin Smith, and a sister, Mrs. Grace Clemons, both of Medford.
