Sportsmen Club Supports Bill To Make Steelhead Trout Game Fish in All Streams in Oregon

Oregon Sportsmen Club of Jackson County passed a resolution Friday night favoring the passage of Oregon Senate Bill No. 78 which proposes that the steelhead trout be classed as a game fish in all streams of the state. The measure would be referred to the voters of the state at the next regular general election.

Another resolution stated the Sportsmen's opposition to House Bill No. 617. The legislation would provide that no person could operate or maintain a shooting range of any kind unless he has obtained a certificate of safety from the department of state police. Under the bill the department could refuse to issue a certificate, revoke the same or order ranges closed if regulations are violated or if unsafe conditions exist.

Members of the club postponed taking a stand on House Bill 700 until the board of directors could study the measure and bring a recommendation before the group.

The bill would enable the state fish commission to use natural obstructions or place rocks or traps in the streams of Oregon to obtain salmon, shad, sturgeon or other anadromous, food or shellfish or eggs for propagative, experimental, exhibitive or scientific purposes.

Members heard a report on the discussions and field trip in the Klamath Falls area last week end on game department management of the interstate mule deer herd. Discussion brought out a consensus of the group that the game commission has gone too far in the matter and should halt doe seasons.
