Seawolf Officially Joins Navy Saturday

Groton, Conn. — (U.P.) — America's second atomic-powered submarine, the Seawolf, officially joined the Navy Saturday. Commissioning ceremonies were held for the Seawolf at the electric boat division of the General Dynamics corporation where the sub and her "big sister," the Nautilus, were constructed.

The Navy's top submariner, Rear Adm. Frederick Warder, director of the service's undersea warfare division, personally attended the commissioning.

Warder and two other visitors had a special interest in the affair. The admiral and Capt. Richard B. Lynch and Royce L. Gross, a retired admiral employed by Electric Boat, all commanded the old World War II Seawolf, which was lost in action.

Ukrainian Scientists Discover Aged Dwelling

London. — (U.P.) — Ukrainian scientists have discovered a dwelling built by prehistoric men out of mammoth tusks and bones, Moscow radio said Friday.

The dwelling was found on the right bank of the River Dnipro at the village of Mezina, an area which "has become world famous as a dwelling place of prehistoric man," the broadcast said.

Dinner to Mark NEA 100th Anniversary

Members of the Jackson county National Education association will observe the 100th anniversary of the NEA at a dinner Thursday, April 5.

The dinner, to be held at 6 p.m. at Medford Senior High school, will be one of a series of Centennial Birthday parties being held throughout the nation that day.

New officers of the county NEA unit will be installed during the evening and pins will be presented to retiring teachers. The birthday dinner is being held this year in lieu of the traditional annual NEA luncheon.

In 1857, a group of 43 teachers organized the National Education association. They met to advance "whatever measures are best adapted to promote the highest interest of society." One of the first committees of the new association was created "to report what the times and the conditions of the country demand of educators, in the way of teaching the principles of our government; also the rights and duties of the citizen."

As the first principle of its code of ethics, the NEA says: "The primary obligation of the teaching profession is to guide children, youth and adults in the pursuit of knowledge and skills, to prepare them in the ways of democracy, and to help them to become happy, useful, self-supporting citizens."

CARE Package Recipients Write To Medford Resident

L. G. Weaver, 301 Haven st., reported last week he has received a number of letters from Germany, all of which are gratifying, but some of which are a bit puzzling.

Weaver has sent CARE packages to Germany on several instances and each time he has received a letter of gratitude from the recipients, he said. But some of them have been in German, which he cannot read, and other in English—which sometimes are almost as hard to read as those in German.

The letters are written in European-type script, which varies considerably from handwriting common in this country, and the English grammar and usage, obviously learned in school, are not better than most Americans could do in German.

Johnston Demands That Charges Of Cannibalism Be Taken to UN

Washington. — (U.P.) — Sen. Olin D. Johnston (D-S.C.) demanded Saturday that charges of widespread cannibalism and political breeding in Soviet slave camps be taken before the United Nations.

Johnston urged the Senate to pass a resolution calling upon the state department and UN Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge to forward the charges to the international organization.

The charges were made in testimony Friday before the Senate Internal Security subcommittee by a refugee Hungarian professor of Latin who said he spent 10 years in 60 different slave camps in Russia.

The 41-year-old refugee, testifying under the name of George Batori, unfolded a horrifying tale of cannibalism, political breeding, unspeakable filth and disease common to the lot of 20 million people imprisoned by the Red regime.

Become Animals
Batori, speaking through an interpreter, said that life in the camps, some of which held 300,000 prisoners, is "hard to picture."

Former Resident Visits in County

Eberhart is married to the former Miss Ernestine Gilstrap of Medford. He was city editor of the Ashland Tidings for three years and left Ashland when he began working for the United Press in 1937. He has held his present position in Canada for about seven years. For about five years prior to then, he was stationed at Honolulu, Hawaii, with the United Press.
