The grant includes tuition at the University of Poitiers, France, as well as full traveling and living expenses and a stipend for incidental costs.

Miss Perreard will probably leave for Europe in August with other young Americans who have won Fulbright awards, and will spend some time in travel before beginning an orientation course at the Sorbonne in Paris. Classes at Poitiers will begin about the first of October.

With a French family background and intensive study of the language, as her college major, Miss Perreard speaks French fluently. She is minoring in Spanish and education at Marylhurst and this term is teaching language under supervision at Grand High school in Portland. She is a graduate of St. Mary's high school in Medford, where she did her preparatory work in languages.

Miss Perreard is the fourth Fulbright winner among Marylhurst students in the past few years.

As acting president of Marylhurst chapter, Pi Delta Phi, Miss Perreard presided at an informal meeting of the national French Honor society at the college the afternoon of March 24.
