Clinic Association Sets April Member Campaign

Local membership campaign of the Southern Oregon Child Guidance Clinic association will get under way in April.

Adults will be contacted through personal letters to join the estimated 700 present members of the clinic. These members will receive the 1957 spring newsletter of current happenings in the association and the clinic it sponsors. Current Medford members, totaling about 288, will be asked to renew their memberships.

Affiliated With UMC

As a partner of the United Medford Crusade, the association cooperates with that drive in Medford during September and October, and delays its local membership campaign until spring. Residents outside of the area of the United Medford Crusade are contacted for membership during the fall.

Services of the Southern Oregon Child Guidance Clinic association include study and treatment of emotionally disturbed children and their parents, consultation sharing with other professional groups and educational programs to further the understanding of human needs and relationships, child development and wholesome family living.

These activities are coordinated by the board of directors. The present 21 directors are Mrs. Carl Wimberly Jr., Medford, president; Dr. Brandt Bartels, Medford, vice president; Mrs. John Bohnert, Central Point, secretary; John Graff, Medford, treasurer; Mrs. Earl Lawson, Medford, representative to Unit-

ed Medford Crusade; Elliott Becken, William Duhaime, Mrs. Melvin Hall, Elwood Hedberg, Mrs. Roland Holmes, Mrs. Dwight Houghton, the Rev. Richard Jones, Robert Minear and Al Potter, Medford; William Dawkins, Mrs. Chester Fitch, Dr. Alva Graham, Dr. Aubrey Hill, Ashland; Mrs. Lewis C. Dusenberry, Trail; Mrs. Phil Engle, Rogue River; and Mrs. W. H. Young, Eagle Point. Each director is elected for a three-year term. Retiring in 1957 will be Mrs. Wimberly, Mrs. Houghton, Mrs. Engle, Dr. Hill, the Rev. Mr. Jones, Minear and Potter.

Clinic Staff

The clinic staff includes Dr. Harry K. Danielson, assistant psychiatrist, mental health section, state board of health, whose time is allocated to the clinic one day weekly. Miss Mary Vandenberg, MSW, is the full-time staff member who coordinates the clinic's services as well as works in all three programs. Dr. Harold Dickman, clinical psychologist, comes to Medford one day monthly to do specialized personality testing for diagnostic studies.

Psychometric tests done by local school personnel are used by the clinic in cooperation with the schools. The clinic is housed in room 307 of the Leverette building in Medford. The phone number is 3-3174.

Funds Obtained

Although a small amount of the financial income is gained through individual membership dues of two dollars for the clinic's budget, the main support comes from an informed membership. Thus, members can be interpreters of the clinic's work in their own communities and of their communities' needs to the clinic board. Members not only receive quarterly newsletters about the clinic, but are also invited to attend the annual educational and business meeting.

The 1957 annual meeting will be held Thursday, April 25, in the Hedrick Junior High school cafeteria. Dr. Brock Chisholm, international figure in psychiatry and philosophy, will speak about "Growing Up in a New Kind of World." The annual meeting will be open to the public. Reservations for the dinner, to be served at 6:30 p.m., may be obtained for \$1.50. Anyone can attend the talk at 7:45 p.m.

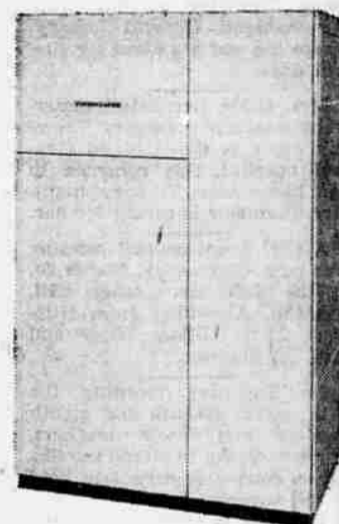

Man Arrested for Planning Poison

Yreka —(U.P.)—Police have arrested a Dorris, Calif., grocer for allegedly planning to poison a neighbor in hopes of marrying the man's wife.

Siskiyou County Sheriff Al Cottar said he arrested Robert S. Smith, a widower, Friday when he returned from Klamath Falls, Ore., where he bought a bottle of strychnine and a pair of rubber gloves.

The arrest was based mainly on a lengthy wire recording of a conversation between Smith and an unidentified witness, Cottar said, in which Smith discussed his plans to murder Cornelio Della Bona, 52.

The sheriff said last Thanksgiving someone had put iodine in Della Bona's wine.

He said that recently, the witness told officers Smith had admitted wanting to "get rid" of Della Bona. The sheriff then installed a wire recording machine in the witness' home.

Cottar said Smith flatly denied planning to kill his neighbor but admitted suggesting marriage to Mrs. Della Bona after the death of his own wife, some four months ago.

Los Angeles — (U.P.) — Dr. Wendell G. Hendricks and his wife, Marcella, Friday agreed to withdraw plans for divorce after also agreeing in superior court that they would sleep in separate bedrooms.

Group Impressed By Armory Here

Salem—Members of a committee to consider a joint armory and civic auditorium in Salem Friday reported they were "well impressed" with a similar building now under construction at Medford.

Twelve officials from Marion and Polk counties and the state military department visited Medford Tuesday to see the city's new National Guard armory and civic auditorium structure.

Claude A. Miller, Salem Chamber of Commerce president and chairman of the Salem Armory committee, said Medford's armory might be taken as a civic auditorium from outside appearance. He commented, however,

that the inside "left something to be desired."

Salem's proposed armory would be about twice the size of the Medford structure and the auditorium would be about 50 per cent larger. A meeting is planned for this week, at which a recommendation for the armory will be presented to Salem civic leaders.
