## Eagle Point Student Receives Award

Gary Foran, Eagle Point High school journalism student, was named winner of the Oregon Journal trophy and a four-year scholarship for outstanding sports reporting at the 12th annual Northwest High School Journalism competition Saturday at Pacific university in Forest Grove.

The university journalism department and Pi Delta Epsilon, national journalism honorary fraternity, annually sponsor competition in sports, news, feature, editorial and speech reporting for students of Oregon and Washington high schools.

First place winners in each category receive a trophy, and full tuition scholarship if the winner chooses to attend Pacific university. The scholarships are awarded unconditionally for the student's first two years at the school and can be renewed for the last two years if scholastic requirements are met. Trophies are awarded by the Oregon Journal, the Oregonian, Beaverton Valley News, Washington County News Times and Hillsboro Argus.

Approximately 35 students from 37 high schools entered each category of the competition. Others competing from Eagle Point High school were Kathy Carroll, editorial writing; Mary Bartling, news writing; and Dick Brown, speech reporting.

## Philharmonic Group Presents Annual Spring Concert

The Philharmonic Society of Southern Oregon closed the 1956-57 season with the annual spring concert yesterday afternoon at Medford High school auditorium.

The audience was considerably larger than those attending the first two concerts this season, society board members reported this morning, and there was the feeling that the final concert had been more successful in every way than the two earlier programs.

Featured soloist was 17-year-old Joanna Lester, lyric soprano from Grants Pass, who won the Philharmonic Society guld auditions earlier this spring.

Making this concert of more than ordinary importance was the fact that an ambitious composition of the conductor, Richard D. Werner, closed the program. Director Werner, who has been composing for a number of years, this time wrote a five-movement suite which he titled "Suite Romantique" and which he terms "a distillation of youthful impressions and experiences."

The first movement, "Promenade" describes a Sunday afternoon walk in the park, with a small band playing in the distance. The "Promenade" is followed by an elegy, written as a memorial to a loved one, and "Valse", a tired boy's remembrance of his mother dancing gaily while he sits among the musicians. A nocturne, calm and introspective, and "Fantasia alla Marcia," described as "life marches on," are the two closing movements.

Miss Lester, believed by many to have a voice of considerable promise, sang the "Waltz Song" from Gounod's "Roméo and Juliette" and Musetta's waltz song from "La Bohème" by Puccini. Her accompanist was Bruno Pellegrini. Her encore was Geršwin's "Summertime."

The orchestra opened the program with the overture from "Marta" and played two Rachmaninoff numbers, "Prelude in G minor" and "Floods of Spring." Next Fisher, Asland, was soloist with the orchestra for Wagner's "Agnie" for coffee served.

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Coffee was served during intermission by members of the Philharmonic guild, headed by Mrs. Mille Kubacke, guild president.
