Feller Predicts Tribe Will Be In Top 3 of AL

Jacksonville, Fla.—(U.P.)—Bob Feller predicts his old Cleveland Indian teammates will finish second or third this season despite brilliant pitching by Herb Score and Bob Lemon—and that the Yankees will meet Milwaukee in the World Series.

Feller, now retired, made the predictions Tuesday on a visit here to promote a baseball youth program.

"Score should win more than 20 games and I think you could say he is worth the million dollars Boston offered for him," said Feller. "I presume Score will make \$500,000 for himself and another 5 million dollars for his club in baseball. And I guess that makes a man worth a million."

But, although he sees Cleveland finishing in the "top three," Feller thinks the Yankees will win the American league pennant "unless Mickey Mantle and Yogi Berra get caught on a clothesline."

As for himself, Feller, now in the insurance business, said, "I want to go back into the game as an owner or part owner."

AAU Opens Nat Meet in Florida

Daytona Beach, Fla.—(U.P.)—The 1957 men's National AAU swimming and diving championships were got underway today with Olympic champion George Breen, a two-time winner last year at Yale, defending his 1,500 meter freestyle title in the opening event.

Breen, now an unattached entry from Cortland, N. Y., and some 20 other long-distance swimmers were to compete with the clock in three heats beginning at 3 p.m.

The 1,500-meter event was to be the first of 13 scheduled for the next four days in the 25-yard-long, municipally-owned Welch Pool. The two diving events, slated for Thursday and Saturday, will be held at a circular pool in the same area.

Potgieter Will Oppose Holman

Portland—(U.P.)—Promoter Tommy Moyer said today that Ewart Potgieter, the South African giant, would fight here next Tuesday night against Johnny Holman of Chicago.

Holman lost to Eddie Machen in a televised bout here last October. He replaces Nino Valdez who originally was scheduled to meet Potgieter but who has the flu, Moyer said.

Harry Glickman, another boxing promoter, said that he would stage his first card here May 6. Glickman indicated that he would either feature "Kid" Matthews or present a talent card.

Wrestlers Begin AAU Tournament

Waynesburg, Pa.—(U.P.)—Three-time NCAA champion Dan Hodge, of Oklahoma, undefeated in 46 intercollegiate bouts, tries for his second straight "grand slam" of wrestling today in the opening of the AAU championships.

The four-day tournament, considered the World Series of Amateur wrestling, features upwards of 200 grapplers. The star-studded field includes collegiate and high school titleholders and independent amateurs from the United States, Canada, Mexico, India and Japan.

Champions will be crowned in eight weight classes, 114 pounds to heavyweight, in free style and Greco-Roman divisions. Greco-Roman allows no holds below the waist.

The Black Tornado will host Saturday to defending champion Grants Pass and to Marshfield, Klamath Falls, Ashland and Crater. Relay meets are regarded as the most colorful of track and field competitions because of their livelier action. Of the 12 events of the Rogue meet all but the discus, pole vault and javelin will be relays. Other events will be quarter-mile, half-mile, mile and two-mile relays, the distance medley, the shuttle hurdles and the shot put, broad jump and high jump relays. A school can pick up only one place in each event. The shuttles and field event relays will have three men on each team and the flat races will have four man crews. Grants Pass and Medford cindermen rank as favorites.
