Union Blacklists Liner Queen Mary

London — (U.P.) — The giant luxury liner Queen Mary was an exile from its home port today despite the decision by Britain's dockworkers to call off their nationwide strike.

Union leaders at Southampton blacklisted the 81,237-ton liner, the world's second largest, because it left port with the aid of Royal Navy tugs last week when regular tug crews refused to handle it during the strike.

The queen put into Cherbourg, France, on its return from New York Monday after the dock unions warned they would not unload it at Southampton, the port from which it has sailed to the United States for more than 20 years.

A smaller Cunard liner, the Ivernia, ferried 1,100 passengers from Cherbourg to Plymouth on Tuesday. They arrived just in time to learn the strike had ended.

Marysville Boy On Shooting Spree

Marysville, Calif. — (U.P.) — A 14-year-old boy fatally shot his grandmother, wounded two elderly men, then shot and killed himself Tuesday without any apparent reason.

Police Chief Jack O. Blevins said the youth, identified as Felton Yarbrough, used a .22 caliber rifle to shoot his 70-year-old grandmother, Mrs. Elizabeth L. Yarbrough, as she rested on the living room sofa.

The boy's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bert Yarbrough, said they had no idea what had provoked their son into committing the fatal shooting.

After killing his grandmother, Blevins said, young Felton ran from the house and fired five shots at two elderly pensioners sitting on a nearby park bench.

The police chief said the boy then put the muzzle of the rifle in his mouth and pulled the trigger.
