Courts Ask That McAllister Springs Be Federal Road

Jackson and Klamath county courts Wednesday agreed to request that the proposed McAllister Springs rd. be designated as a federal forest public road, and that construction be started in fiscal year 1957-58.

Members of the Jackson county court, the county engineer and five Jackson County Chamber of Commerce representatives discussed the proposed road at meeting in Klamath Falls yesterday. Members of the Klamath county court and the state highway engineer's office were also present.

The McAllister Springs rd. would extend from Eagle Point to Klamath Falls via the Lake of the Woods. It would generally follow the route of an existing sub-standard road.

The road has been envisioned as an eventual all-year highway which would supplement or take the place of the present Green Springs highway.

Request to Commission

The two county courts addressed the requests to the state highway commission as a resolution. The resolution cited need for satisfactory and adequate highway facilities to promote southern Oregon's economic interests.

The resolution asks the commission to take the following action:

"1. To cooperate with the Klamath County court and the Jackson county court by interceding in their behalf with the federal bureau of public roads to include the proposed highway, designated as the McAllister Springs easterly to secondary Highway 421 as a part of the federal forest highway system, and

"2. That the Oregon state highway commission in submitting budget requests in connection with the federal forest public road fund, allocate sufficient sums to enable a construction start on this project during the fiscal year 1957-58."

The resolution was signed by Judge Rodney Keating and Commissioners Chester Wendt and Ralph James of the Jackson county court, and Judge C. H. Mack and Commissioners Jerry Rapanus and E. W. Gowen of the Klamath county court.

Boys Admit Theft Of Motor Boat

Two 16-year-old Medford boys are being held by juvenile authorities in connection with the theft Saturday of a 14-foot outboard motor boat and a new 35-horse outboard motor, sheriff's deputies reported today.

One of the boys also admitted assisting with the theft of a car motor valued at \$600 and a gas tank in a break and entry last week at the Marine Supply company in Medford.

Deputies are questioning a third 16-year-old Medford boy in connection with the boat theft. They are also seeking another 16-year-old Medford boy in connection with the motor and gas tank theft.

The boat, owned by Robert L. Peebler, 1871 Marsh lane, Medford, was reported stolen Saturday night. Yesterday deputies received a telephone call from an unidentified woman, who said she had seen a boat fitting the description of the missing one in the garage of a nearby residence.

Officers went to the address she had given and discovered three juveniles working on the boat. They had dismantled it, painted it and installed new chrome fittings, officers reported. The boat was returned to its owner and the motor and gas tank are being held in the sheriff's office.

Schrunk Wants Speedy Trial on Charges

Schrunk was indicted last week by the Multnomah county grand jury.

The mayor waived reading of the two indictments. He was represented by Raymond Kell who told Presiding Circuit Judge Charles W. Redding that Schrunk "feels that as a public officer his trial should be expedited."

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will include camp officials and group directors offices and sleeping quarters. The estimated cost includes fixtures, supplies, servicing and construction, he said.

Several other buildings are planned at the camp site. They include separate sleeping quarters, caretakers house, boat house, shower rooms, storage sheds and other structures.

Actual construction work is scheduled to start as soon as it is possible to get into the camp area, Walsh said. Jaycee members and several professional men from the valley, have assisted in working out plans for the camp, he said.

Medford Jaycees decided to proceed with construction at the camp because they feel there is a need for such a recreation area and because outlying facilities have been limited for many youth organizations in southern Oregon.

Donations Requested

Walsh said donations will be requested to help finance camp construction and purchase material. Jaycee members have offered labor in building the camp, Walsh said, and anyone else interested in donating labor may contact him or any member of the Jaycees.

After the camp is completed, youth groups and organizations will be invited to camp for one-week periods, Walsh said.

The camp committee meets each Monday morning at 7 a.m. breakfast in the Holland hotel, and Walsh said individuals or other organizations interested in attending the meetings has been invited. Serving on the committee are Walsh, John Gustafson and Garry Shuler, coordination; Bob Foster and Al Franke, donations; Don Carlson and Don Yocom, construction; Warren Hayse and Greg Orr, transportation and storage; and Al Holmes and Bob Shangle, plans and policy.

Present Facilities

Present facilities at the camp site, which is on the northeast corner on the lake shore, include one building constructed for the old Salvation Army camp. The structure is used on a temporary basis for storage and small group meetings, Jaycee members said.

Several buildings which were included in the old Salvation Army camp have been removed. The camp was operated by the Salvation Army for several years, but because of problems in maintaining it, the Salvation Army invited the Medford Jaycees to assume responsibilities. Previously the Jaycees provided assistance in operating the camp.

A five-year lease was signed between the Jaycees and the forest service. When the lease expires, if improvements have been fulfilled according to the agreement, a 99-year lease will be signed, Jaycee representatives said.

Delay in Publication Of Nasser Plan Sought

The United States sought Thursday to delay "final" publication of the Nasser plan for operating the Suez Canal but indications grew that Egypt would reject any suggestion smacking of international control.

The position of President Gamal Abdel Nasser of Egypt was strengthened by the apparent victory in Jordan of his ally, Premier Suleiman Nabulsi, in Nabulsi's struggle for power with King Hussein.

Jordan's Ramallah Radio broadcast a statement from Nabulsi saying the nation would develop further its relations with the Soviet Union — an indication Nabulsi had triumphed over Hussein.

Tornadoes Swarm Over Southland; Plains Get Snow

Rains, High Winds Lash Georgia Area

A giant spring storm unleashed a swarm of tornadoes on the South, dumped heavy snows on the North Central Plains and lashed a thousand-mile belt of the nation's mid-section with sleet, ice, drenching rains and high winds today.

Twisters slammed Mississippi, Tennessee and Alabama, killing one person and injuring at least 57.

The Weather Bureau said tornadoes and severe thunderstorms were expected to lash North and Central Georgia and the Western South Carolina during the day.

On the opposite end of the far flung storm, a snow storm piled up to 25 inches of snow on Western South Dakota, played havoc with highway traffic across a broad area of the Northern Plains and forced scores of schools to close in Southern Minnesota.

A United Press count showed at least 28 persons killed and almost 900 injured in the violent storm that began three days ago. Tornadoes have killed 17 persons, 10 of them in the Dallas, Tex., area. Five persons died in the snowstorm as it swept out of the Central Rockies.

Four tornadoes lashed Mississippi during the morning. A twister cut through a rural area near Bay Springs, killing one woman, injuring 15 persons and reducing 10 frame houses to splinters.

Another ripped the Mississippi State sanatorium near Jackson, injuring 30 persons and badly damaging the five-story building.

Homes Smashed

Four persons were injured when another tornado smashed seven homes, a store, church and three barns near Glen Allan, Miss.

A twister injured five persons, destroyed two houses and a cotton gin south of Selmer, Tenn. Other tornadoes were reported south and east of Jackson, Tenn., and gale force winds whipped Memphis and Nashville.

Inquest Scheduled Into Man's Death

An inquest will be held Saturday morning in Central Point into the death of Bud Morris Smith, 67, of 923 Manzanita st., Central Point, who was found dead yesterday in a workshop near his residence, according to Coroner Carlos Morris.

State police said Smith's wife, Mabel Clair, found Smith's body about 4:15 p.m. on the floor of the workshop, which is about 100 feet north of the house. Officers theorized Smith had been shot through the mouth with a .410 gauge shotgun, which was found lying between his legs.

Police believed the shooting occurred about noon. Mrs. Smith told police she saw her husband at 9 a.m., then left home until late afternoon. Police were notified of the shooting about 4:20 p.m., by Keith Lawton, route 2, box 248, Central Point.

State police and sheriff's deputies are working on the case.

Russian Massacres Charged

Boulder, Colo. — (U.P.) — Robert Murphy, deputy undersecretary of state, charged today the Soviet Union has "cruelly massacred thousands of Hungarians who sought freedom from Soviet tyranny."

Murphy made the statement in an address prepared for delivery before the 10th annual Conference of World Affairs sponsored by the University of Colorado.

Murphy's speech was the second sharp U. S. attack in two

days on the Moscow dominated Hungarian government. The State Department charged in Washington Wednesday that the Kadar government follows the "worst practices of the Stalinist terror."

U. S. diplomats planned to boycott a Hungarian reception in Washington tonight commemorating the 12th anniversary of Hungary's "liberation" by Soviet troops from Nazi conquest.

Murphy said Russia alone is

to blame for failure by the United Nations to secure withdrawal of Soviet forces from Hungary.

"The blame for this failure lies squarely at the door of the Soviet Union, which cruelly massacred thousands of Hungarians who sought freedom from Soviet tyranny," he said. "Nevertheless, the United Nations has succeeded in focusing and maintaining the pressure of world opinion on these Soviet outrages."

Holmes Announces New Oregon State Fair Commission

Salem—(U.P.)—Five new members of the Oregon State Fair Commission were named today by Gov. Robert D. Holmes who accepted resignations of members of the former board Tuesday.

They will begin immediately directing plans for the 1957 fair program, now five months away. The new commissioners, including three Democrats and two Republicans, are:

John H. (Jack) Travis, Hood River print shop operator; Del Milne, manager of the Marion hotel in Salem and veteran of radio and theater work in Portland; V. A. Roush, Myrtle Point garage owner and Coos county fair manager for 20 years; Mrs. Elmer O. Berg, Salem club leader, educator and co-chairman of the 1956 Stevenson for President Committee in Oregon; and Ursel C. Narver, Portland, editor of the Oregon State Grange Bulletin and Better Fruit magazine.

Travis will be chairman of the newly organized commission. His term will expire April 2, 1961.

The commissioners succeed Dr. Earle B. Stewart, Roseburg; Henry Ahrens, Turner; Hollis Goodrich Jr., Portland, and Mrs. Bernard Schucking, Salem, all of whom resigned, and Harold Barnett, Pendleton, whose term expired April 2.

Milne and Narver are Republicans; Travis, Mrs. Berg and Roush are Democrats.

Chief Threatens Drastic Cutback To Begin Saturday

Emergency Funds Sought From Congress

Washington — (U.P.) — Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield announced publicly today that he may have to order a drastic cutback in mail service starting Saturday unless Congress gives him an emergency \$47 million appropriation. **May Close Windows**

He said he may have to shut down all post office windows on Saturdays, halt Saturday mail delivery service and make other reductions in service.

Summerfield called an "emergency" press conference to announce that he was waiting "minute by minute and hour by hour" to decide what mail service cuts would have to be made.

Summerfield said "this will be the most difficult decision any postmaster general in history has ever been called on to make."

His decision hinges on the outcome of an angry row with the Democratic controlled House Appropriations subcommittee which has voted to give him only \$17 million of the \$47 millions he says he needs to keep the department going full blast until July 1.

Republicans Hopeful

Democrats on the subcommittee were standing firm, but Republicans hoped that the House would side with Summerfield and vote him the full amount.

Summerfield said the Post Office department is considering the following curtailments: —Embargo acceptance and delivery of all third class mail, except merchandise.

—Discontinue city carrier delivery of all classes of mail on Saturdays.

Fewer City Deliveries

—Close all post offices on Saturdays and discontinue rural delivery of all classes of mail on Saturdays.

—Discontinue sale of money orders throughout the country for the next three months.

—Reduce deliveries of mail in business districts of cities from two and three a day to one a day.

Summerfield declined to say which of the measures would be given "priority."

Preliminary Work Starts on Budget

The Jackson county budget committee this morning completed preliminary work on budgets submitted by three county departments for 1957-58.

Budget for the justice court at Gold Hill was approved as presented. The request was for \$2,680, a decrease of 1.3 per cent over last year's allocation. Also approved as presented was the circuit court request of \$21,540, a 10-5 per cent increase over last year. Requests from the Ashland justice court was reduced \$240 by the budget committee, making the budget allocation \$7,096, the same as last year.

Committee members said the total requested 1957-58 budget of \$2,807,146.59 shows wage increase proposals totaling \$80,246.60 over last year. Proposed travel expense increases for the coming year total \$5,390 over last year.

The approved 1956-57 budget was \$2,645,290.07. No tax levy was required last year and no levy would be necessary if the requested budget were approved, according to the committee.

Coos Bay Teamsters Oppose 'Defense Fund'

Coos Bay—(U.P.)—Members of Teamsters local 689 at a jammed meeting last night voted unanimously not to make contributions of any nature for a "defense fund" for international officers under fire by the Senate Rackets Committee.

Members said attendance was the largest at any meeting of the local in years.

Youngest Iranian Premier Pledges Loyalty To West

Tehran, Iran — (U.P.) — University head Manouchehr Eghbal took office today as the youngest Premier in Iran's history and immediately pledged loyalty to the Baghdad pact and the West.

"Our friends and alliances will remain as firm as before, and we will respect all of our commitments," Eghbal told the United Press in an interview immediately after presenting his new Cabinet to the Shah.

The 48-year-old former court minister and chancellor of Tehran University replaced Premier Hussein Ala in a government crisis climaxed by the slaying of three American members of the U. S. Point 4 aid mission here.

An unconfirmed report reaching here from Zahedan, headquarters of the search for the killers, said one leader of the Dad Shah bandit gang was captured Wednesday night by a posse of loyal Baluchistan tribesmen.

The government armed a considerable number of tribesmen to help in the hunt for bandit lord Dad Shah and his renegades.
