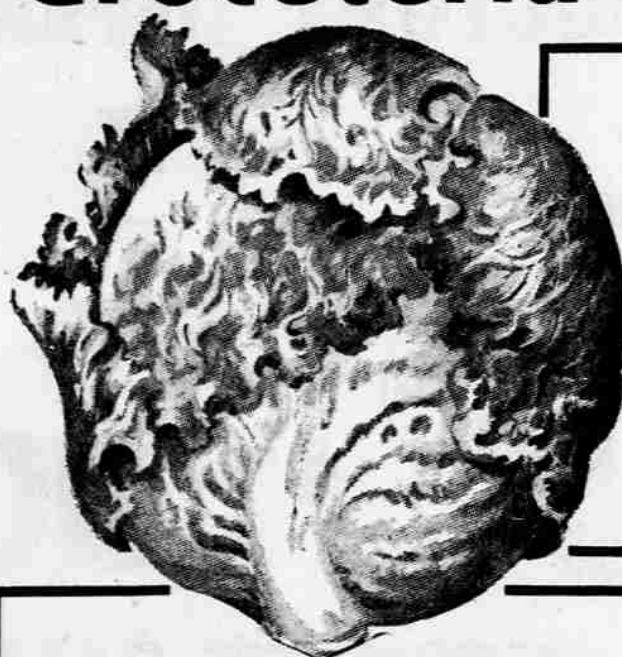

Pennsylvania Train Engine Killed in Commuter Collision

Secaucus, N. J. —(U.P.)— The engineer of a Pennsylvania Railroad commuter train was killed and 26 passengers were injured Wednesday night when it slammed into the rear of a "deadhead" baggage train near here.

The engineer, Clyde E. Cochran, 58, of Iselin, N. J., was crushed inside the cab of the engine which was derailed in the New Jersey meadows about six miles west of New York City.

The injured were returned to Pennsylvania Station in New York in the undamaged passenger cars and taken to St. Vincent's and Bellevue hospitals for treatment.

Carried 156 Passengers

The six-car local left Penn Station for New Brunswick, N. J., at 11:05 p.m. EST, with 156 passengers. It struck the rear of a standing eight-car New York Central baggage train east of Secaucus shortly after it emerged from a tunnel under the Hudson river.

The passenger train engine and two cars of the baggage train were derailed, blocking the main line. Seven trains scheduled to leave Penn Station were delayed.

The crack Keystone Limited, carrying 400 passengers from Washington to New York, bore down on the scene on an east-bound track shortly after the wreck. The engineer slammed on his brakes when he spotted signal flares, but the parlor car of the limited scraped one of the derailed cars. No one was injured on the limited.

Seattle Gambler Named In Multnomah Indictment

Portland —(U.P.)— Seattle gambler Joseph P. McLaughlin surrendered yesterday to five new indictments returned by the Multnomah county grand jury in connection with its probe into vice conditions here.

McLaughlin was freed on \$5,000 bail. The new indictments generally follow similar indictments returned against McLaughlin by a grand jury last summer.

Teamster Indorsement Could Be Death Kiss

Portland —(U.P.)— City Commissioner Stanley Earl asserted in a speech here Wednesday that unless the Teamsters union cleans house a Teamster indorsement would be the kiss of death to politicians in future Oregon elections.

Earl declared that the day is past when politicians will seek Teamster financial aid or worry whether their picture makes the Teamster newspaper.

The commissioner predicted that Congress would enact legislation to safeguard rights of individual union members but he added that legislation is not the final answer.

"The final solution will come when Teamsters elect their officers by ballot and not by a convention of paid stooges," he said.
