SOUTHERN ZONE SHOOT ON SATURDAY, SUNDAY

Medford Gun club members are among those hoping for a good break in weather this week end. Warmth and sunshine should mean a sizable turnout for their seventh annual Southern Oregon zone trapshoot. Entrants are expected from throughout southern and southwestern Oregon and the Willamette valley.

Shooting will start at 10 a.m. Saturday and Sunday firing will begin at 9 a.m. Shotgunners will have an opportunity to blast at 100 targets at 16 yards, 100 handicap clay pigeons and 25 pairs of doubles. That program offers 500 targets to entrants here for both days.

Registered
The event is registered by the Pacific International Trapshooting association. Trophies will be presented to winners and runners up in the handicap and in each class of the 16-yard and doubles shoots. There will be special trophies for high lady and high junior in the Sunday 16-yard program.

A buddy shoot for two-man teams will run concurrent with the Sunday 16-yard and handicap competition. Any two shooters may enter and are not required to shoot on the same squad.

The shoot will be the second registered one here this season. Spectators are invited to the grounds. Lunch will be available at the club's dining hall.

Idaho Staters Ahead in Boxing

Pocatello, Idaho—(U.P.)—The Idaho State college boxing team held a 9-3 lead over Michigan State Friday in the 20th annual NCAA boxing championships after battering down opponents in five bouts in the college gymnasium.

Other teams which gathered points through wins in quarter-final fights were San Jose State college and Syracuse, 2 points each, and Sacramento State, Washington State, California Polytechnic and Nevada, 1 point each.

Hits Many in Other Games But Yanks Need Only One Safety To Beat Phillies

In baseball, as in horse racing, there are always the imponderables to consider. How else could you explain the New York Yankees winning a spring exhibition game on only two hits and the Milwaukee Braves losing a game despite a 16-hit barrage.

Eight springtime tuneups on Thursday produced a staggering total of 171 hits. That's an average of more than 21 hits a game. Yet the Yankees needed only one of those bingles to defeat the Philadelphia Phillies, 1-0.

Robin Roberts worked the first eight innings for the Phillies, yielding only a safe bunt to

Hank Bauer in the fourth inning. When Roberts was lifted for a pinch hitter, rookie Dick Farrell took over in the ninth and lost the game. Woody Heid tripled and scored on Gil McDougald's sacrifice fly.

Homer Happy Dodgers
The Braves, meanwhile, out-hit Brooklyn 16-14, in a wild contest at San Antonio, Tex., but still lost out to the homer-happy Dodgers. Duke Snider unloaded

two home runs and Carl Furillo, Gino Cimoli and Charley Neal each connected once to whip Milwaukee, 14-8.

Elsewhere along the exhibition circuit, hits were a dime a dozen . . . or cheaper.

The Baltimore Orioles, of all people, collected 22 safeties in whipping the Chicago Cubs, 18-5. Tito Francona led the Baltimore hit parade with four, including a home run, while Bill

Gardner also homered for the Orioles.

In another slugfest at Salt Lake City, the New York Giants broke a three-game losing streak with a 13-hit attack that wrecked the Cleveland Indians, 9-6. Allan Worthington went seven innings for the Giants and gave up eight hits, including two homers by Vic Wertz.

Pirates Hang On
The Pittsburgh Pirates as-

saulted Virgil Trucks for eight hits and four runs in the first two innings and hung on to defeat the Kansas City Athletics, 4-3. Gene Freese of Pittsburgh drove in two runs with two singles and also sparkled in the field.

An impressive three-inning relief job by Ellis Kinder enabled the Chicago White Sox to edge the Boston Red Sox, 6-5, in 11 while the Cincinnati Redlegs

downed the Washington Senators, 5-4, on a 10th inning single by Don Hoak.

While all this hitting was going on, Sam Jones and Hoyt Wilhelm who were acquired in off-season trades, pitched the St. Louis Cardinals to a 5-4 victory over Detroit Tigers. Jones struck out seven and scattered six hits in seven innings, while Wilhelm choked off a bases-loaded rally by the Tigers in the eighth.

Gene, Sugar Fight May 1

Chicago—(U.P.)—Middleweight champion Gene Fullmer and Sugar Ray Robinson signed formal contracts Thursday for a 15-round championship fight at the Chicago Stadium May 1.

The pact, also signed by president James D. Norris of the sponsoring International Boxing club, gives each boxer 30 per cent of the net gate receipts plus another 30 per cent apiece as their share of the \$100,000 paid for television rights.

The championship battle will be telecast nationally with the Chicago area blacked out.

Robinson, at 35, will be trying to recapture the 160-pound crown he lost to the 25-year-old champion from Salt Lake City in a 15-round unanimous decision Jan. 2 at New York's Madison Square Garden.

Grants Pass—(U.P.)—Gordon Prehm, assistant prep basketball coach here for six years, has been named head hoop mentor to replace Ray Davis, who resigned to go to Coos Bay as assistant football coach at Marshfield high.

The stock issue will be made available to the public at \$10 par value per share as soon as the prospectus now in the hands of the printer has been received.

This prospectus has been approved by the commissioner of corporations, and states specifically the program of development of the Mount Shasta ski bowl for which the funds derived from the sale of stock will be used.

It also contains the history of the project and the expected returns to the stockholders as verified by disinterested parties.

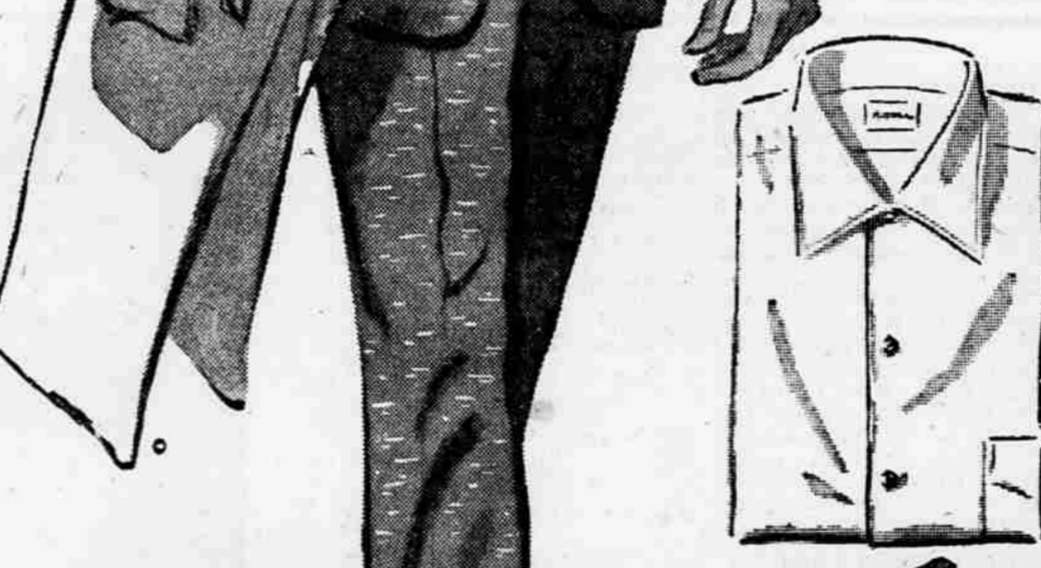

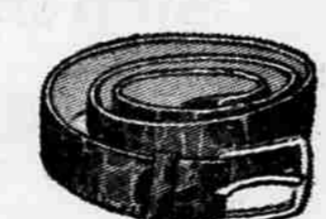
