

### Girl's Shooting Of Geologist Said Not Accidental

Clinton, N. J.—(U.P.)—A police official said Thursday night the shooting of a Salmon, Idaho, geologist by the daughter of a prominent attorney and former prosecutor in the Lindbergh kidnaping case was not accidental.

Sandra Hauck, 15-year-old blonde, was in an hysterical condition and under sedatives in her home when Detective Chief Ray Bastedo announced issuance of a complaint of arrest.

In Flemington, N. J., geologist Dr. Thomas Stoetling, 56, fought for his life in Hunterdon County Medical Center with a bullet wound in the abdomen. He was a house guest in the Hauck home when the shooting occurred.

The girl's father called the shooting "accidental."

"Frankly, we don't believe it," Bastedo was quoted as saying in disclosing the complaint, a legal device which permits Sandra, a juvenile, to remain in her parents' custody while

### Resolution To Add Legislature Members Receives Approval

Salem — (U.P.) — The Oregon Senate late yesterday passed Senate joint resolution 9 calling for the addition of one member to the Senate and one to the House, giving the Senate 31 members and the House 61.

But because of the way the vote went, observers said the measure might have a hard time surviving in the House, with its strong Democratic majority.

**Would Break Deadlocks**

Gov. Robert D. Holmes and other Democratic leaders, backed by labor leaders, have advocated the post of lieutenant governor for Oregon. He would preside over the Senate and, in case that chamber was deadlocked 15-15, cast the deciding vote.

The Senate, with 15 Republicans and 15 Democrats, was deadlocked for the first 10 days of this session.

The vote on SJR 9 was 18 to 12, with the 15 Republicans voting solidly for the proposal and three Democrats joining them—including President Boyd Overhulse. The other two Democrats voting for the resolution were Sens. Jean Lewis of Portland and Harry D. Boivin of Klamath Falls.

**Change in Constitution**

Should the resolution pass the House, the proposal, involving a change in Oregon's constitution, would be referred to the people at the 1958 general election. And should the people approve it, the extra member to each chamber would be elected on the basis of population as determined by the 1960 federal census.
