**Hawaii Teamsters Come To Beck's Aid**

Honolulu — (U.P.) — The Hawaii local of the Teamsters Union came to the aid of International President Dave Beck Friday with a \$15,000 check for the union's Defense Publicity Committee.

A resolution accompanying the check said the Teamsters Union "is being tried in the newspapers to give the impression that the Teamsters are racket-ridden."

Without naming Beck, the resolution said, "We believe in the assumption that a man is innocent until proved guilty."

The \$15,000 and the resolution were mailed to the union's international headquarters. The money was dues withheld for the past two years while local president Arthur Rutledge has been feuding with Frank Brewster, head of the Teamsters' West Coast Conference.

The Hawaii local has 2300 members.

**Portland Financial Houses Plan Merger**

Portland — (U.P.) — Merger of two large Portland financial houses has been disclosed.

Boards of directors of the Benjamin Franklin Federal Savings & Loan and the First Federal Savings and Loan Association approved the merger which now must go before the Federal Home Loan Bank board.

The merged firm will operate under the Benjamin Franklin name and present First Federal offices will be retained.

The combined institutions would have assets of some \$55 million and savings amounting to about \$50 million.
