Radiation Exposed Marshall Natives Appear Uninjured

Chicago—(UPI)—Six Marshall Island natives who were exposed to radioactive fallout during the 1954 hydrogen bomb test apparently suffered no permanent injuries, according to scientists at Argonne National Laboratory.

The group is scheduled to return to the islands Tuesday after completion of radiation tests at the atomic laboratory in suburban Lemont.

The natives arrived here last Thursday at the invitation of the government. They were flown by the Navy from their home islands of Majuro and Utirik in the Pacific.

Over 200 Exposed. Argonne spokesmen said the six were among more than 200 natives on the two Marshall islands who were exposed to radioactive dust and ash from the H-bomb test.

Dr. Norman Hilberry, director of the Atomic Energy Commission laboratory said medical tests indicated the natives suffered no permanent disabilities. He said a seventh native who was not exposed to the fallout accompanied the group to act as a "control" in the tests.

An AEC medical specialist, Dr. Robert A. Conard, said the islanders suffered skin burns and loss of hair, but have completely recovered.

The natives were decked out in American clothes, rented in Honolulu, and Navy issue shoes, which they shed at every opportunity because they pinched their feet.

"They're used to going barefoot," Conard said.

Carl D.—Clara will just have to take her medicine. Clara W.—I have a right to his protection. Carl D.—I've gotten into one terrible mess and I just don't see my way out.

I've been married for three years and I'm in love with my wife, but I got involved in a silly flirtation with a girl in my office. Well, one thing led to another and I had relations with her and now she is pregnant.

After all, I am bearing his child and I have a right to his protection. He has no other children and it is only right for him to marry me.

Carl now blames me for the whole thing, but he doesn't mention that he took me out twice before he told me he was married. Later he told me that while he loved his wife, they were not happy in the physical side of their married life.

Naturally, when he continued to ask me out, I thought the marriage was breaking up anyway. Carl can never be happy with his wife—even if he could succeed in winning her back. I am willing to live with him in a common-law relationship until he gets a divorce. Isn't that the only right thing to do?

The Council: It is impossible to talk of the "right thing to do" in a case where all rights and responsibilities have been so completely violated. Carl and Clara know that they were both dead wrong and have no business blaming one another.

Clara should, first of all, get it through her head that Carl neither wants nor loves her and offers her no hope of marriage. His wife is most unlikely to be so kind and obliging as to offer Carl a divorce any time in the near future.

Even if she would, Clara may not be able to get Carl to marry her—and even if he did marry her, he is unlikely to give her the "protection" or any form of happiness. Has she considered the likelihood of his getting involved in a "silly flirtation" with another girl in his office—a girl very much like herself, who would "assume" the marriage is breaking up?

Clara must stop her wishful daydreaming about Carl and figure out what she must do about herself and her child. She can base no hopes whatever on Carl and must decide whether she wants to keep her child or give it out for adoption. She must discuss these matters with a trained social worker attached to a recognized family agency. She can learn to live a decent, even happy life, if she recognizes her own immorality and foolishness and ceases to blame others.

The same is true for Carl. He ought to try to learn something about marriage and its obligations. (Copyright 1957, General Features Corp.)
