Dorothy Druschel, area chief of social service, whose office is in San Francisco, visited here last week, conferring with Manager E. K. Ricker and Robert E. Kelley, in charge of social service at the dormitory.

Miss Druschel is a native of Portland, a graduate of Oregon State College, and was employed by the state welfare department in Multnomah county before joining the Veterans administration.

Dr. Walter S. Lee, area dental director, making his annual tour, was here for two days and observed installation work of new laboratory equipment. The change will enable the station to complete most fabrication work on the spot, instead of sending it to a central lab elsewhere.

A series of "educational" movies is being shown to the dietetic service, emphasizing sanitation, safety and modern conveniences in preparing food which is both "clean and palatable." Restaurant practice was noted where a large number of people are served.

William J. Woods, activity assignment leader, and his assistant, Bill Creighton, decided two months ago that the card file was inadequate in routing men referred to them by the Planning Board for the various duties required in the activity schedule.

Creighton, who has had experience in store management, got busy and built a "dispatch" board designed for the special needs in handling all classes of assignment.

Approximately 30 groupings of jobs for 665 names of men assigned, compose the board, which enables at a glance to see which openings the men sent to them can fill.

"Mike" Tanzell, who assisted Thelma Williams with the Legion auxiliary work for several years, has taken over the new assignment for providing clothing to men in need.

He has an office in Section One, where he handles such items as coats, trousers, underwear, shoes and other wearing apparel, donated by the volunteer organizations and others for use of members without funds. Such donations may be sent to Section One, VA Domiciliary.

Tanzell handled this assignment along with other duties when Mrs. Williams was in charge of this distribution.

A busload of children furnished entertainment, sponsored by the VFW auxiliary, Rogue River, last Wednesday night. Dorothy Burkett was in charge and was master of ceremonies.

Bonneville Opens Radio Station Bids

Portland — (U.P.) — Bonneville Power Administration today announced opening of bids for two very high frequency stations in central Oregon for communication with mobile transmission line maintenance equipment.

Low bids of \$5615 and \$5729 respectively were submitted by Mann Construction Company of Redmond for construction of the Bend radio station about one mile northwest of the city limits and the Crescent Butte station about four miles east of Crescent.

Completion schedule for the work is 75 days after notice to proceed.

Many Co-Eds Turn Thoughts to Summer School in Hawaii

Honolulu — (U.P.) — Comes spring and some co-eds in at least 44 states start thinking about that palm tree-covered campus on the beach of Waikiki.

Each year the University of Hawaii has become the summer school home of an increasing number of stateside students who long for a Hawaiian vacation—with an occasional class in swimming and hula dancing.

The boys come, too, but by and large, the campus is crowded with bright-eyed mainland co-eds who attend classes dressed in aloha shirts and Bermuda shorts.

The university is already making plans to take care of more than 1,000 visiting students this summer. The western states of California, Washington and Oregon will supply the majority, but, surprisingly enough, last year Illinois, Michigan and New York were next in representation.

Students from 13 foreign countries, principally Australia, Japan, Korea and the Philippines, also made Honolulu their summer headquarters.

Hula and Sun Tan
Contrary to general belief, the university campus is not located at Waikiki and the buildings are mostly of modern stone construction. But Hawaii's most famous landmark, Diamond Head, is plainly visible to any student wandering to class, and the beach is only two miles away.

The curriculum calls it "Dances of Hawaii," but it's really hula dancing and the most popular summer school course. Still, the school is fully accredited and offers a varied choice of courses ranging from Chinese literature to world civilization.

School tuition fees run \$8.50 per credit hour with no added charges to out-of-territory students. Total enrollment is expected to be more than 4,000 this summer.

Most students say that nowhere but at the University of Hawaii can they study calculus, learn the hula and get a sun tan at the same time.

Dog's Life Getting Harder in Kansas

Mission, Kan. — (U.P.) — It's getting harder and harder to lead a dog's life.

Three suburban communities near Kansas City—Mission, Merriam and Fairway—have decided that their canine citizens must be law-abiding or face the consequences.

If the pooches don't behave, they are hauled into the animal clinic, locked up and held until their masters bail them out.

In many cases, there is a type of responsibility clause requiring dog owners to appear in court and pay fines ranging from \$1 to \$50 for offenses committed by their delinquent pets.

The ordinances generally require that a dog be leashed, penned or within earshot of his master, registered and inoculated for rabies, prohibited from damaging property and restrained from making disturbances such as barking, fighting and biting. The number of dogs is limited by requiring a person with more than two dogs to buy a \$20 kennel license.

Team Named To Prosecute Schunk

Salem — (U.P.) — A former Yamhill county district attorney and a former assistant attorney general will handle prosecution of indictments against Mayor Terry Schunk of Portland, Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton said today.

Elliott Cummins, the former Yamhill county district attorney, and Ralph Wyckoff, former assistant attorney general, also will handle indictments against Clifford O. Bennett, ex-Portland night club operator, and Patrolman Richard Sutter, Thornton said.

Cummins and Wyckoff already have been assigned to prosecution of other cases arising out of the Multnomah county vice investigation.

Schunk, who had asked that Thornton personally handle the charges against him, was indicted on bribery and perjury charges in connection with a bribe he was alleged to have received from Bennett while he was Multnomah county sheriff. Both Schunk and Bennett, who was charged with perjury, have vigorously denied the charges.

Sutter was indicted on a perjury charge.

3 Negro Youths Charged With Rape

Dallas, Tex. — (U.P.) — Three teenage Negroes charged with raping a white girl were transferred from jail in Sherman to Dallas Monday night for their own protection.

Anonymous telephone calls Monday hinting at mob violence brought back memories of 1930, when the Grayson county courthouse in Sherman was burned to the ground, along with a Negro being held for rape. The man's charred body was hanged to a tree.

The three youths were hunted down with bloodhounds early Monday after Howard Edwards, 17, told police his girl friend was raped by three Negroes who held a rifle on him.

Sammie Frank Lewis and Thomas Windell Bell, 17, were charged directly with rape. Their 15-year-old companion was charged in juvenile court and authorities said he probably would be charged with rape when he reaches 17.

Time for the trial was set for 2 p.m. after two court appearances for Langley were scheduled earlier today.

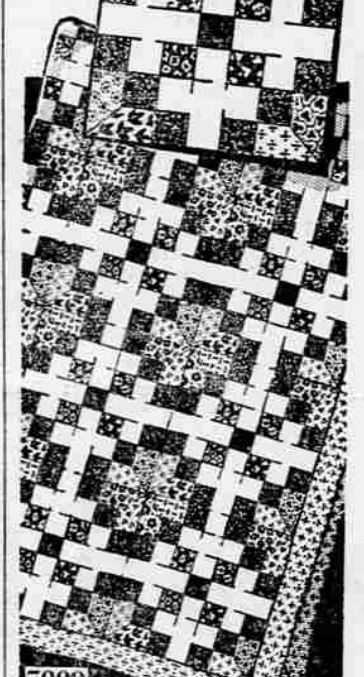

Elkins and Clark are scheduled to go on trial next Tuesday on a charge of illegal wiretapping.

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Youngsters in 1890s Had School Problems

Tomahawk, Wis. — (U.P.) — A stack of stained but legible assignment sheets showed Tomahawk grade school pupils that youngsters in the 1890s had scholastic problems, too.

The papers were found during remodeling operations of the old Whittier School.

One test paper listed 11 errors in a 20-word spelling test. Some of the fractured words in the

'90s were "merortoryis" (meritorious), "phearse" (fierce) and "schollarship" (scholarship).

Another student gave this geographic report:

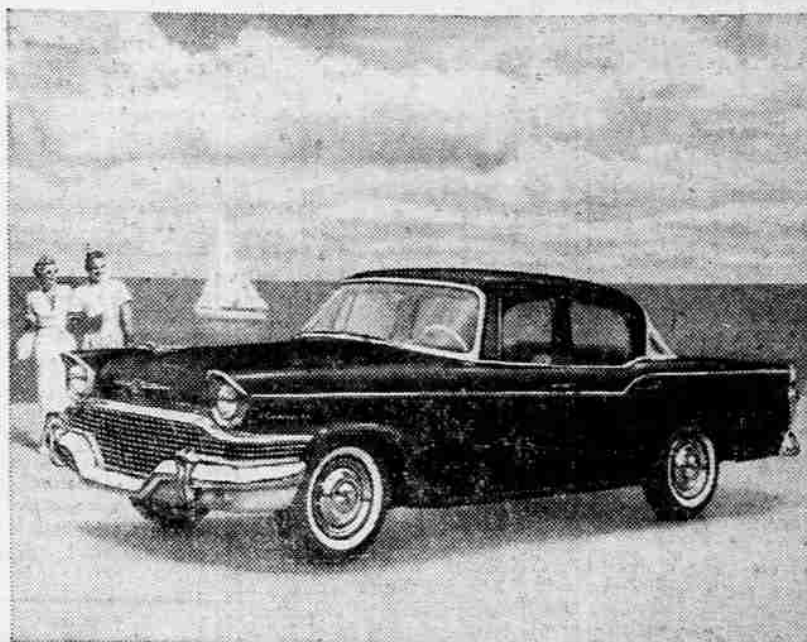

Registered letters were first accepted by the U. S. postoffice department in 1855.

"Give ma a little tobacco, because I am going to the mill. I will pay you back. Good bye."



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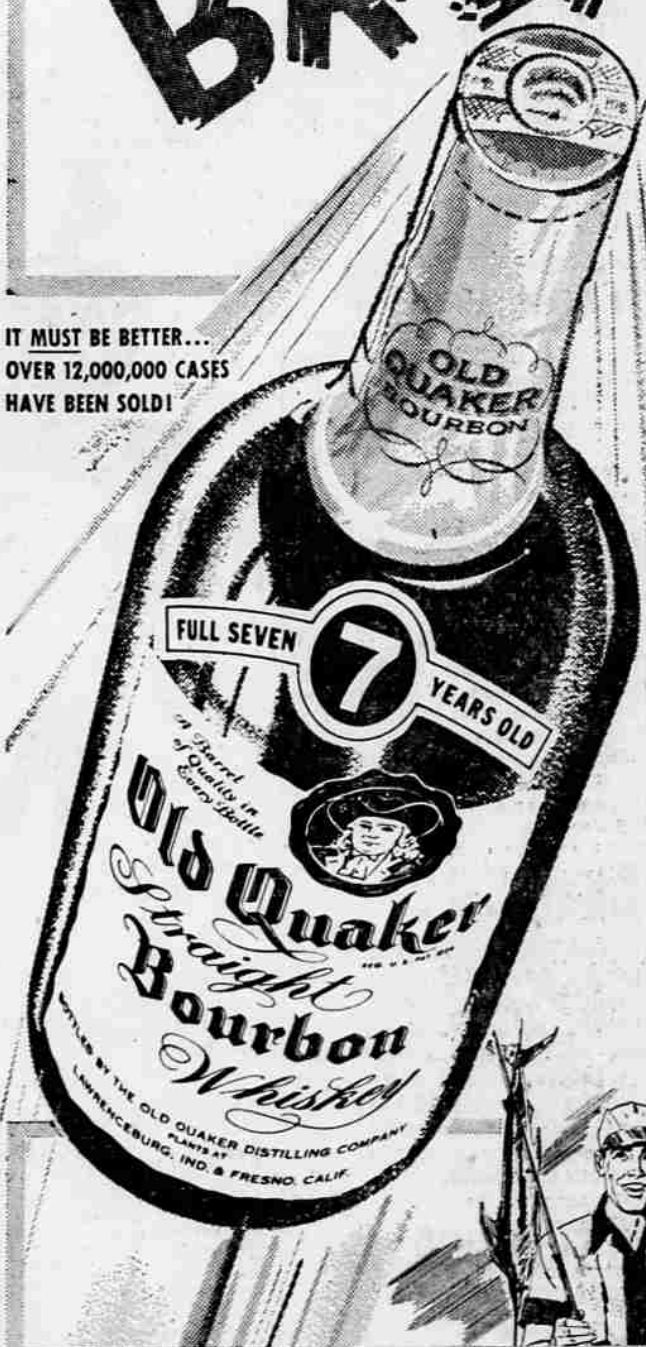
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
