

Herb Score Sizzles In Tiff for Indians

Herb Score, the Cleveland Indians' left-handed flamethrower, is ready to start shooting for a third straight major-league strikeout crown on opening day, if the Indians want him.

Showing no bad effects from the swollen right knee that has bothered him during the spring training, the 23-year-old, 20-game winner at last showed regular-season form Wednesday night as he pitched seven shut-out innings and fanned seven batters in a 4-1 triumph over the Giants in Miami.

Score's sizzling job against the Giants was doubly satisfying for him. For one, it came

after some of his hometown fans from Lake Worth, Fla., honored him before the game with a silver plate. For another, it came a few hours after the Giant's manager Bill Rigney had rated his own lefty Johnny Antonelli as a better pitcher than Score.

Allows Two Hits

Score allowed the Giants just two hits in his seven innings and Don Mossi, who followed yielded one—Willie Mays' 10th homer of the spring for the Giant's only run.

Cleveland scored all its four runs in the first inning against Pete Burnside on five walks, a wild pitch, and George Strickland's two-run single.

Score's showing was in contrast to a weak effort by the Yankees' southpaw ace and opening-game pitcher Whitey Ford who was driven out by Savannah of the Sally league after allowing four runs, seven hits, and five walks in seven innings.

Don Drysdale became the first Brooklyn pitcher to go nine innings as he blanked the Milwaukee Braves, 5-0, on four hits and fanned five.

Patterson Has British Offer

New York—(U.P.)—Manager Cus D'Amato said Wednesday he has received an offer from England for Floyd Patterson to defend his world heavyweight title in London, but he referred that a defense be made in the United States, "under promotion other than the International Boxing Club."

D'Amato said the London offer was "one of several we have received." He would not divulge the promoter who made the offer or the proposed opponent, site or date. "Amato did say, however, that the opponent would not be an English fighter, Ingma, Johansson of Sweden is the European heavyweight boxing champion.

"In order to make such a match, the British would have to amend the rule which now requires that one or both of the principals be a British subject," D'Amato said. "But in view of the fact that this would be a world title match, I see no reason why the rule could not be waived."

Hunting and Fishing Southern Oregon

The delayed salmon season finally got under way last Saturday when Boyd McClung registered a 20 pounder for the first fish prize at the Grants Pass Sporting Goods store. The fish was taken about a mile above the Robertson bridge. On Saturday there were several fish hooked in the same area but managed to get away.

Water conditions are ideal now for fishing and reports indicate that there are quite a few fish in the river. The season should get into full swing within the next two weeks at the latest.

Probably one reason that there aren't too many fish being reported is the fact that most of the anglers have been waiting for that first fish and are only now getting their boards out in the river.

WALTONIANS ACT

There was an interesting discussion concerning the proposal of amending the present law restricting the waters of the Rogue river for industrial purposes, at the regular meeting of the Isaac Walton Chapter held in the Jackson hotel last Monday evening. The club went on record as opposing this amendment.

Contact was made subsequent to this meeting with some parties in favor of the amendment to ascertain just what was desired by it.

It would appear that the main reason for the proposal was to avoid frightening away interests which are or might be in the future investigating the Rogue valley as a possible site for the establishment of various types of industry.

It was reported that the man who introduced the subject spoke of a pulp plant as one of these industries and of course this really set up a hue and cry for anyone who has ever lived near or even driven by such a plant has a difficult time forgetting the odors which permeate the surrounding countryside, not taking into consideration the large amounts of water needed or the detrimental effects of the waste products on the river and fish life.

It was felt that this reference to a pulp plant should never have been made.

NO DIFFICULTIES

When the question was asked if the present law was causing any difficulties it was admitted that it was not at present time but there was talk of the possibility that the city of Grants Pass could shut off the supply of water to a plywood plant, for instance—which seems very unlikely due to the economic situation.
