Model UN Tackles Current Problems

Stanford, Calif. —(U.P.)— The 1957 model United Nations made up of students from 38 western colleges and universities, today tackled such current problems as the Hungarian question and the admission of the new African state of Ghana.

Stanford, the host school, is representing the secretariat, Charles Reynolds, 21-year-old history major from Albany, Ore. is serving as the secretary general.

More Newspapers Increasing Prices

New York —(U.P.)—Three hundred and seventy-nine of the nation's 1,738 daily English language newspapers are now selling for more than a nickel, the American Newspaper Publishers Association reported Wednesday.

The ANPA's annual survey of newspaper prices showed that 97 of those newspapers had raised prices during the last year.

As of today, the ANPA said, 69 newspapers are selling for six cents, 249 for seven cents and 61 for ten cents. There were only 43 ten-cent newspapers a year ago.

"Daily newspapers retailing at five cents represent 76.4 per cent of total newspapers, compared with 81.4 per cent in 1956," the ANPA said. "Sunday editions of daily newspapers retailing at 10 cents represent 44.4 per cent of total, compared with 44.9 per cent in the last survey. Number selling at six cents, seven cents, 20 cents and 25 cents increased, while the number of five-cent, 10-cent, 12-cent and 15-cent decreased. One paper is selling at 13 cents."

Vatican Easter To Get Radio and TV Coverage

Vatican City —(U.P.)— The Vatican said today that Easter 1957 will receive the most intensive radio and television coverage to date.

All three of the major ceremonies of Easter — the Pontifical High Mass in Saint Peter's the open air Mass in front of the church and the Papal blessing from the balcony — will be either televised or broadcast by radio.

Schools representing the major nations are: Oregon State, United States; St. Marys, France, California, U.S.S.R.; UCLA, United Kingdom, and Washington State, Nationalist China.

Dr. Tsiang Ting-fu Nationalist China's permanent delegate to the United Nations, addressed the 550 student delegates Wednesday night during the colorful opening ceremonies.

He termed the Soviet Union the "chief obstacle" to world peace and said the United Nations "has been impotent" to deal with this obstacle.

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Tax Cut Drive By Democrats Seen

Washington —(U.P.)— Republican leaders said today it looks as if the Democrats are launching a tax-cut drive that probably can't be stopped short of a presidential veto.

They found the Democratic intention in House Speaker Sam Rayburn's statement that he believes chances are good that conditions will be favorable later this year for a cut in personal income taxes and possibly some other taxes effective next Jan. 1.

The Republicans said privately that however strongly the administration opposed a cut it will be hard to stop except with presidential action.

The Democrats officially set two conditions for a tax reduction in a strategy huddle attended by Rayburn, House Democratic Leader John W. McCormack (Mass.) and Democrats of the House Ways & Means Committee which initiates all tax legislation.

Rayburn announced that Democrats will push for a tax cut to take effect Jan. 1 if federal revenues hold up sufficiently and if Congress acts enough from President Eisenhower's record peacetime budget of nearly \$72 billion to justify it.

He emphasized that Democrats "are not going to be irresponsible" and push for tax relief now and will not do so later this year unless it is justified.

Man Kills 2, Self As Children Watch

Trenton, Mo. —(U.P.)— A former convict, who saved a guard's life during a prison riot, killed his wife and mother-in-law with shotgun blasts Wednesday night and then took his own life while his three small children watched.

Freddy Dykes, 28, shot and killed his 20-year-old wife, Carolyn, and her mother, Mrs. Gordon Scott, in the living room of the Scott's farm home while his children sat by, Sheriff George Mapes said.

Dykes then bundled his children in a car and drove to the home of his wife's sister, Mrs. Helen Persell.

Mapes said he called his sister-in-law to the car, gave her his five-month-old son's bottle and asked her to "take care of my children."

He then took his own life with the .410 shotgun before the children could get out of the car.

Mrs. Persell called Mapes and told him three-year-old Gordon said: "Daddy shot Mommy at Grandmaw's."

Mapes said Dykes, while serving a sentence for a grand larceny conviction in the Missouri State Prison at Jefferson City, saved a guard's life during a riot in 1955.

Tests of Eden To Be Completed on Friday

Boston —(U.P.)— Sir Anthony Eden undergoes a final battery of tests today.

Medical studies are expected to be completed by Friday, according to a hospital bulletin.

A statement from Dr. Richard B. Cattell Wednesday said a consulting physician, Dr. Sara Jordan, has been called into the case. Dr. Jordan is an authority on diseases of the stomach and intestines and she will check Sir Anthony's "colon condition" Dr. Cattell said.

The ailing former British prime minister is reported to be suffering from an inflammation of the colon, which prompted him to cut short his extended New Zealand vacation with Lady Eden and seek medical aid.

Survivors of Brazil Plane Wreck Found

Sao Paulo, Brazil —(U.P.)— A radio message from Acheita Island said today searchers had found survivors from the wreck of a Brazilian commercial airliner with 29 persons aboard.

The message was received by the control tower at Congonha airport. It did not say how many persons had been found alive or what condition they were in.

The plane, a Real Aerovia DC3 carrying 25 passenger and four crewmen, apparently all Brazilians, was en route here from Rio de Janeiro Wednesday when it was reported to have crashed in the vicinity of the island.

Indian Freighter Catches Fire at Suez

Suez, Egypt —(U.P.)— The 7,000-ton Indian freighter Jalvalah caught fire Wednesday night while at anchorage in the port of Suez and was still blazing early this morning.

Twenty-one passengers were landed safely in Suez and no casualties were reported.

The freighter was to have entered the canal in a north-bound convoy, but flames broke out in the No. 4 hatch which was loaded with general cargo.

Another Bomb Hoax Delays Plane Trip

Los Angeles —(U.P.)— A TWA airliner carrying 56 passengers was ordered back to International Airport Wednesday night after an anonymous woman telephoned a warning that "your plane to Philadelphia won't make it!"

Police labeled the incident another bomb hoax after a search of the plane failed to turn up any explosive. The plane and another scheduled flight to Philadelphia were cleared for takeoff following the search.

Airline officials said the call was received at TWA's office at the airport. They said the caller hung up after blurring out the brief warning.
