Coach Bill Bowerman's strong Oregon track and field squad, unbeaten in Northern Division dual meets since late in the 1955 season, opens its 1957 campaign Saturday against a tough Washington State team at Pullman. The meet may match some of the top sophomores in the conference as Oregon sends Steve Anderson, Phil Knight, Jim Grelle, Bob Amble, Gene Estes, Jack Burg, Gerry Christian and Mark Robbins against the Cougar rookies led by Steve Frye and Kernanen.

Oregon has a solid group of veterans, paced by the incomparable Jim Bailey, Martin Pedigo, Ed Bingham, Jack Morris, Jack Brown, Doug Basham and Sam Whitney, who are also counted on heavily to score against the Cougars as Coach Bowerman looks for his fourth straight win over Washington State.

Anderson, the versatile rookie from Tacoma, will team with Morris and Brown in the sprints, join Morris and Basham in the low hurdles, and also take a turn at the broad jump with Pedigo and Sam Taylor. He also may enter the javelin along with Bingham if Coach Bowerman sees a need for the chance at extra points.

Bailey, the second fastest miler in the history of racing and unbeaten in collegiate 880-yard competition, will run one or two races, if he goes in the mile, he

Owners Asked To Keep Animals From Roaming

Portland—Though the weatherman may not be indicating it in some parts of the state, spring is just around the corner. This means one thing to the wild birds—it's time to nest. It is also the most dangerous time of the year for them.

Though winter weather often works hardships on them, predators take their toll now. Among some of the worst predators on nests are free running domestic dogs and cats. They not only kill the nesting birds but will destroy any nest they may encounter.

Fall hunting populations of game birds are dependent on good spring crops of young ones. If nests are destroyed or the nesting females killed, it means that many less birds come fall hunting season.

The Oregon State Game commission urge all pet owners to keep their animals from roaming the fields for the next few months and give the birds a chance to raise their families.

Fish Technician Promotions Told By Game Official

Portland—Four Oregon Game commission fishery technicians were recently elevated to new positions on the game commission's staff, it was announced by Phil Schneider, state game director.

Filling the post of personnel director, which has been vacant for several months, is Ross Newcomb who moved into his new position last month. Prior to his appointment, Newcomb was fishery research biologist attached to the wildlife research unit at Oregon State college.

Horner Campbell, fishery technician from LaGrande, will take over the post of fishery biologist at the research station. Campbell will assume his duties as of April 1.

John Dimick, who headed the game commission's lake and stream rehabilitation program and was coordinating fishery technician for special projects of the fishery division, was moved up to chief of service and supply. At the present time, Dimick will serve as understudy to Henry Mangold, present service and supply chief, who will retire from the commission June 30.

Jumping into Dimick's shoes is Robert Borovicka, district fishery agent at Bend. Borovicka will be assigned to the fishery division staff in Portland as head of rehabilitation and other special projects. Borovicka's promotion will be effective April 1.

All four technicians have had long, meritorious service with the game commission and have acted in many capacities. Campbell, Dimick and Borovicka are graduates from the department of fish and game at Oregon State college, while Newcomb took his formal training at the University of Maine and culminated with a master's degree at Oregon State.

St. Mary's got two runs in the first inning on singles by Ron Pruitt and Ed Fogel and a two-bagger by Jack Daley. In the next frame a single by Alson Geren, double by Terry Cooper, two passed balls, a base on balls, a fielder's choice, a sacrifice and an error figured in three runs. Two crossed in the third panel on a hit by Geren, two errors, a walk, a double steal and a fielder's choice. Darland stole home.

Daley and Darland got safeties in the five-run fourth inning. There were eight RR errors. Two walks and a single by Cooper got a fifth inning marker.
