News About Books From the Library

Where are the books? Have you ever wondered why a title you seek is so elusive? The library staff made a special check one day last month to learn the whereabouts of its 44,000 books.

A list of titles added to the library during the past two weeks follows. Books were donated during this period by Lois Goss, Jacksonville, M. L. Smith, Ralph Krows, Jim Coppenhaver, Francis C Wimberly and John Reter. The total number of volumes added was 122 the number of new titles 63.

Reports from branch libraries indicated that about the same proportion of the latter, one of four, or 1,288, were in circulation among borrowers on that day.
