JACKSONVILLE Dog Law to Be Enforced

Jacksonville — Police Chief Frank Carter has reminded Jacksonville residents that all dogs within the city limits must be tied or restrained during gardening season from April 1 until Aug. 1, according to city ordinance.

For the first offense dog owners will be fined \$5. The second time a dog is caught loose he will be picked up and taken to the county dog pound and held five days and then destroyed if the owner does not agree to keep the dog confined at home. Dogs are also to be kept at home at night, he said.
