Corps Announces New Commissions

Portland—The Women's Army corps is now offering direct commissions as second or first lieutenant to college graduates between 20 and 33 who meet the mental, moral and physical requirements. It was announced today by Captain Lillian E. Baker, WAC recruiting officer for Oregon and Southwestern Washington.

Those women who are accepted for commissioned assignment to the corps will serve for two years, twenty weeks of which is devoted to a thorough briefing in military procedures at the WAC Center, Fort McClellan, Ala.

During orientation the women receive the pay and allowances of their rank. After their briefing, they are assigned to a variety of interesting jobs ranging from company duty to personnel management and from public relations to intelligence.

They receive the same pay and allowances as their male counterparts. Free medical care, 30 days' paid vacation annually, steady promotions, planned career patterns, and retirement incomes are theirs.
