

Hubbard Brothers Marks 73rd Year In Business Here

Hubbard Brothers Hardware firm, Main st., and Riverside ave., is celebrating the 73d anniversary of its founding starting today.

The anniversary will be marked by specially reduced sale prices on merchandise in the store.

Members of the firm are Roland, Chester and Robert Hubbard. It was founded by Fortunatis Hubbard at Jacksonville in 1883 and has remained in the same family since that time.

Fortunatis Hubbard was a personal friend of John Deere, who established the John Deere Implement company. Hubbard Brothers store is the oldest continuous John Deere dealer west of the Mississippi.

Moved to Medford

The firm was moved from Jacksonville to Medford soon after its establishment. It was set up on a lot at Central ave. and Main st. The store has been at its present location since 1885. The building originally housed a saloon and general store. In 1933 the firm bought the building next to the present store, and in 1934 the two buildings were adjoined.

Family ownership of the store has included Fortunatis Hubbard in 1883; Fort Hubbard, 1884 to 1891; A. C. and Lex Hubbard, 1891 to 1896; Fort Hubbard, 1896 to 1926; A. C. Hubbard, 1891 to 1943; Roland Hubbard, 1919 to the present; Chester Hubbard, 1930 to the present and Robert Hubbard, 1948.

The anniversary sale will end Saturday, April 27.

Teamster Officials Asked To Answer To Charges of 'Goon Squads in Scranton

Washington — (U.P.) — The Senate Rackets Committee hauled up three Teamster union officials today to answer charges that they furnished "goon squads" for a wave of violence against non-union building contractors in Scranton, Pa.

The witness list was headed by John Durkin, convicted of conspiracy in the dynamiting of one house being built with non-union labor and under indictment for shoving over the wall of another house.

Durkin, in a brief appearance Wednesday, refused to state his occupation. He took refuge in the Fifth Amendment which guards against possible self-incrimination. He is secretary-treasurer of Teamsters Local 229 in Scranton and vice president of the Pennsylvania Federation of Labor, both connected with the AFL-CIO.

Scranton Windup Today
The AFL-CIO has taken the position that union officials who use the Fifth Amendment before congressional committees have no right to hold office.

Durkin and Teamster business agents Robert Malloy and Joseph McHugh were recalled today because their attorney was absent Wednesday. The committee hoped to wind up the Scranton case with their testimony.

Committee counsel Robert F. Kennedy told newsmen the committee had no plans to question public officials from the Scranton area about testimony at Tuesday's hearing. This included charges that police protection was lacking in the face of union violence.

Scranton Mayor James T. Hanlon submitted an affidavit denying earlier testimony of ex-boxer Paul Bradshaw, sometime Teamster muscle man, who claimed the mayor once asked him to "lay off" spilling the story of the house dynamiting until after a 1955 city election.

The committee asked the Justice Department to seek a perjury indictment in connection with conflicting testimony of Joseph Bartell, president of the Scranton Building Trades Council, and other witnesses.

Bartell, business agent of Local 261 of the Carpenters Union, denied Bradshaw's charge that

Bartell ordered the non-union-built house damaged. He swore he was innocent of the conspiracy charge of which he was convicted.

Two other Scranton union leaders convicted with Bartell also said they were innocent. They testified that their superiors have made no move to remove them from office despite the new AFL-CIO ethics code which calls for ousting convicted labor leaders.

The two were Philip J. Brady, vice president of the Building Trades Council and business

agent of Local 81 of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, and Anthony J. Bonacuse, a trustee of the Building Trades Council and business agent of Local 130 of the Common Laborers Union.

Admits Pushing Detonator

Three other Teamster Union members convicted of doing the actual dynamiting with Bradshaw invoked the Fifth Amendment on almost all questions Wednesday. They were union "muscle man" Robert Hubshman, who was threatened with contempt of Congress for his silence; George Murphy, and Joseph Mallow, younger brother of Teamster official Robert Mallow.

William Munley, who testified that he pushed the detonator on the dynamite blast, insisted he blew up the house only because Bradshaw asked him to. He insisted no union official ordered him to damage the house.

Helen Canfield, Bradshaw's beautiful girl friend, who works as an egg candler, testified she made tape recordings of Munley and Murphy talking about details of the dynamiting.
