Meaning of Easter Is Discussed at Kiwanis Meeting

"The True Meaning of Easter" was told by elaboration on five points by the Rev. Kenneth Korb, pastor of St. Peter's Lutheran church, yesterday at the noon luncheon of Medford Kiwanis club.

Easter means terror and fear, faith and freedom, joy and victory and hope, the minister said. It also means God is love, the pastor declared.

Mr. Korb spoke of Jesus as the Great Divider as well as the Great Unifier and said that "man will fall and be crushed or fall on Him and be saved." The pastor brought out that Jesus said that all power is in His hands and that Christ was put to death but is alive. He stated that for a man not living under Christ and for Him, He is an enemy and to have Him alive strikes that man with terror.

Describes Freedom
The minister described freedom as that of being set free from self seeking and guilt and set free "to be like God intended you to be in the beginning." He pointed to "One among us who has paid for all our sins and guilt."

Concerning love, Mr. Korb told of God's joy and delight in creating a man who serves other people. He spoke of love as a quality which stops serving itself and starts giving. The speaker stated that Christian hope is that, "despite the fact of what we are and have been, God has dealt with our sins and those attached with Christ will be with him after they die."

Mr. Korb brought out that the Christian joy is "the joy that life already is lived in victory" and that the Christian idea of victory is that "it already has been won in the resurrection."

The trading tempo picked up after President Eisenhower proposed sending cuts totaling almost \$2 billion and Speaker Sam Rayburn (D-Tex.) forecast a tax cut.
