DAR Winding Up 66th Convention With Installation

Washington — (U.P.) — The Daughters of The American Revolution wind up today their 66th Continental Congress, a convention started by unexpected dissents to some perennial resolutions.

A colorful installation ceremony of seven new vice presidents general, elected in balloting Thursday, and voting on a few minor resolutions were the main items of business at the morning's closing session.

Annual Banquet Slated
The daughters will get together once more to relax at an annual banquet tonight.

Mrs. Robert Henry Humphrey, Swainsboro, Ga., won the most votes Thursday night among the seven vice presidents general elected.

Mrs. Humphrey had 1,494 votes. She was followed in the voting order by Mrs. Arthur Leslie Allen, Pueblo, Colo., with 1,475 votes.

Others elected vice presidents general for three-year terms and their votes were: Mrs. William Edmond Hicks, Shreveport, La., 1,449 votes; Mrs. William Wallace McClaugherty, Bluefield, W. Va., 1,418; Mrs. Harold Foor Machlan, Coral Gables, Fla., 1,390; Mrs. Edwin Frederick Abels, Lawrence, Kan., 1,340; and Miss Ruth Stayton Massey, Osceola, Ark., 1,285.

When major resolutions came up Thursday there was a surprising show of minority opposition to 7 out of 24 proposals.

In the past only an occasional lone dissent has marred the usual unanimous approval of resolutions.

The two resolutions getting the most "no" votes were one opposing United Nations membership of Red China and urging American withdrawal from the U.N. if Red China ever is admitted, and another opposing registration of firearms.

Oregon City Worker Feels 57,000 Volts

Oregon City — (U.P.) — John E. Paullin, Oregon City, was reported in fair condition in a local hospital today after touching 57,000 volts of electricity and living.

Paullin, a Crown Zellerbach employee, suffered second degree burns to a hand and arm Wednesday when a steel measuring tape apparently flipped into high power lines. Paullin was hurled several feet into the air and officials said this probably saved his life as it broke the circuit.

Oregon Accidental Death Rate History's Lowest

Portland — (U.P.) — Oregon enjoyed the lowest accidental death rate in its history in 1956.

Dr. Harold Erickson, state health officer, said the rate was 60.9 per 100,000 population, compared to the all-time high of 109.9 in 1941.

Automobile deaths took the heaviest toll with 466 fatalities. Home accidents took 219 lives; public accidents 209, and occupational deaths 149.
