

Black Tornado Nabs Twinbill From Crater Comets 6-1, 3-0

Medford high, intent on getting back into the championship chase, ended its win drought in Southern Oregon conference baseball by rapping the Crater high Comets on Friday.

Tornado diamonds entered the victory side of the league ledger by taking the opener of a doublebill at Central Point 6 to 1. They won the non-counting second ruckus 3 to 0.

A heavy barrage of extra base swatting in the late innings, five hit hurling by Dick McLaughlin, catcher turned pitcher, and near-fleeting fielding manufactured the conference decision.

Larry Perkins, Dennis King, McLaughlin and Ron Peery were the hard-whacking batsmen. Medford pushed over all its runs in the first inning of the second game.

Blanked Four Innings For four innings Friday Comet twirler Fred Herrmann handcuffed the Black Tornado, allowing no hits, walking just one man and recording seven strikeouts. Then Peery led off the top of the fifth stanza with a fly to deep center field for a three-bagger. Steve Shorey slapped a line single to left field to drive Peery home with the first run.

Perkins, King and McLaughlin slammed consecutive three-basers with none away in the sixth inning for two more runs, and Wayne Allen relieved Herrmann on the hill. Three more counts crossed the plate in the seventh canto. Perkins and McLaughlin smashed doubles for the second extra base blows of the day. John Payne beat out a bunt for a single. Gordon Owsley sacrificed. There were an error and wild pitch in the inning.

Neil Green got on base for Crater in the sixth inning and gained home on back to back singles by Dick Rainey and Bob Fowler. The Comets missed one possible opportunity to score in the fifth inning when Eddie Koch singled, took second on Charlie South's sacrifice and went to third on a wild pitch. Koch was out trying to go home when Thurman Striplin drew a base on balls.

McLaughlin in throwing his five hitter racked up five strikeouts. He walked three. Herrmann had 10 strikeouts, issued two bases on balls and yielded five hits in his five plus innings on the mound. Allen was tagged for three safeties, fanned one and gave no walks.

Singles by Peery and Bob Pond, a base on balls to Owsley, a fielder's option swat by Dennis King and an error were the factors in Medford's first inning scoring of the second fust.

Larson Fails To Show Series Form

The Brooklyn Dodgers and the Milwaukee Braves, picking up right where they left off last year, struggled to narrow victories Saturday to remain unbeaten in their first three games.

Johnny Podres, pitching in his first regulation game since the 1955 World Series, hurled the Dodgers to a 2-0 shutout victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates, while stout-hearted relief pitching by Red Murff enabled the Braves to down the Cincinnati Redlegs, 5-4.

Podres, who spent last year in the Navy, blanked the Pirates with six hits, striking out nine, walking two and allowing only one player to reach third base.

Murff, who pulled Milwaukee starter Ray Crone out of a jam in the eighth inning, got into trouble himself in the ninth. With the Braves leading 5-4, Pete Whisenant opened the Cincinnati ninth with a double and moved to third on a long sacrifice fly by pinch hitter Ted Kluszewski.

Murff, however, Murff then got Frank Robinson on an infield out and retired Smoky Burgess on a foul fly to end the game.

Rookie Ed Bouchee collected four hits and veteran Willie Jones drove in four runs in leading the Philadelphia Phillies to a 6-5 victory over the New York Giants. The Giants tried to pull the game out of the fire in the ninth when Dusty Rhodes led off with a triple, but relief pitcher Bob Miller of the Phils retired the next three New York batters without allowing a run.

In the American league, the New York Yankees and the Chicago White Sox each posted their third straight victories without a loss.

The Yankees needed 12 innings before pulling out a 10-7 victory over the Boston Red Sox with the aid of a two-run homer by Hank Bauer. The Red Sox knocked Don Larsen, who was making his first official

Portland—(U.P.)—The Portland Boxing Commission has received a recommendation from its physician that the suspension of Ewart Potgieter by the Massachusetts Boxing commission be upheld.

Dr. Clinton McGill said his recommendation was made after telephone conversations with Dr. Philip Henneman of the Massachusetts General hospital in Boston, Mass., where Potgieter had an operation to correct a glandular condition late last year.

Dr. Henneman revealed to Dr. McGill that Potgieter had promised to return to the hospital one month after the operation after his discharge for further examination and, if necessary, for further treatment.

The 325-pound South African had been fighting out of Portland. Dr. McGill has recommended that he return to Boston, for the examination requested.

Boston School Teacher Wins Overland Classic Boston—(U.P.)—Johnny Kelley, a school teacher from Groton, Conn., brought Boston A.A. Marathon laurels back to America for the first time in 12 years Saturday winning the overland classic by half a mile.

Kelley, a boyish-looking 25, turned in a time of two hours, 20 minutes and five seconds as he breezed past the finish line looking nearly as fresh as when he started the 26 mile, 385 yard grind. This was the 61st running of the race.

Jansen, a former Seal, kept the crowd of 2,140 quiet for most of the afternoon and was in little trouble, especially after Seattle scored four times in the third to lead by 5-0.
