

## TABLE ROCK Dunsmuir Crash Kills Two

Table Rock — An auto trip to San Francisco ended in tragedy when the car driven by A. E. Fisch of this area collided with a lumber truck near Dunsmuir Friday, April 12. Fisch and his five-year-old daughter, Marjorie, were killed.

Seriously injured were Mrs. Fisch and Ray Wyatt, proprietor of the Table Rock store, passengers in the car. Wyatt is now in the Sacred Heart hospital with a fractured skull, broken arm and other injuries. Mrs. Fisch is being treated for injuries in the Mt. Shasta hospital.

The Fisch family, although not so very well known in the community, were building a 12 room home on the north slope of lower Table Rock, and intended to move here after the completion of the dwelling.

Salem—(U.P.)—Robert T. Stanley, 55, state highway department bridge designer and member of the Salem Planning and Zoning commission, died in his car here Friday night. Police said he apparently had suffered a heart attack.

Stanley had attended a banquet of the Professional Engineers of Oregon and was driving home when the attack occurred. Stanley was in charge of the

preliminary layout section of the highway department bridge division. He was a member of the Oregon State Board of Engineering Examiners. A graduate of Oregon State college, he had been with the highway department for 25 years.

## County Officials Visit in Klamath

Members of the Jackson county court, County Engineer Paul Rynning, Road Supervisor Bill Watenburg and a Columbia Equipment company representative spent Thursday in Klamath Falls.

During the day they watched two demonstrations of a roadside ditch clearing machine, visited the Klamath county farm and juvenile detention home and met with the Klamath county court.

The Klamath county court asked advice of the Jackson county court concerning appropriations for porcupine control bounty. The Jackson county group made comparisons between the Klamath county farm and the one here, and compared the juvenile detention home with the one under construction here.

They observed that Klamath county's problem of juvenile delinquency involves more girls than boys, the opposite of the situation here. Plans are under way for a new detention home.

The group left Medford at 8 a.m. Thursday and returned at 7 p.m.
