Veteran Showman Killed in Nevada

Las Vegas, Nev.—(U.P.)—Veteran showman Nils T. Granlund, known to his public as NTG, and to his friends as Granny, was injured fatally Sunday in a taxi cab accident on the Las Vegas Strip.

The 57-year-old producer-director died at Southern Nevada Hospital several hours after he was injured when the cab in which he was a passenger collided with a car near the Riviera Hotel. Granlund was thrown to the pavement by the impact. Word of Granlund's death shocked his many entertainment world friends. Eddie Cantor, whom NTG introduced to radio for the first time, said, "I just can hardly believe it. He was a wonderful guy and discovered many people who now are stars."

NTG also was credited with introducing Harry Richman and the late Al Jolson to radio audiences. As a producer he helped develop such stage and screen stars as Jean Harlow, Joan Crawford, Alice Faye, Ruby Keeler, Ethel Merman and Marie McDonald.

Car Hits House; Woman Injured

Helen Schaefer Ballantyne, 39, of 748 West Fourth st., Medford, suffered a compound fracture of the right leg early this morning when the car she was operating crashed into the side of a house, according to city police.

Neuberger Dedicates New Plant at Albany

Albany, Ore.—(U.P.)—The new Way Chang zirconium plant was dedicated here today by Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) who said the operation provided the type of payroll needed in Oregon to restore the state's lagging economic structure.

"Not only will this important manufacturing establishment contribute a vital material to the defense of America and the rest of the free world," Neuberger said, "but it also will serve to take up the slack in jobs created by recurring unemployment in Oregon's basic lumber industry."

The Oregon Democrat also praised scientists and engineers of the U.S. Bureau of Mines, who he said had helped make Albany a center of "basic and fundamental research into the importance of new metals to nuclear projects such as the pioneering submarine 'Nautilus.'"

Quick Action Saves Young Shock Victim

Bend—(U.P.)—Quick action by a young friend was credited today with saving the life of Kim Ward, 12, who was knocked unconscious by an electrical shock Saturday.

The friend, Philip Young, was knocked down by the shock but ran about a quarter of a mile to get help. Young Ward had stopped breathing when firemen arrived, officials said.

The two boys were rifle shooting Saturday when they saw a gopher run into a length of irrigation pipe. They lifted the pipe in an effort to shake the gopher out so he could be shot. But the pipe came into contact with a 12,000 volt power line.

Ward was knocked unconscious and the Young boy was knocked to the ground. He ran to Ward's house where Ward's mother called firemen and an ambulance. Firemen found the boy who had stopped breathing but applied artificial respiration and used a resuscitator to revive him.

Ward was reported in good condition in a local hospital today. The Young boy suffered burns.
