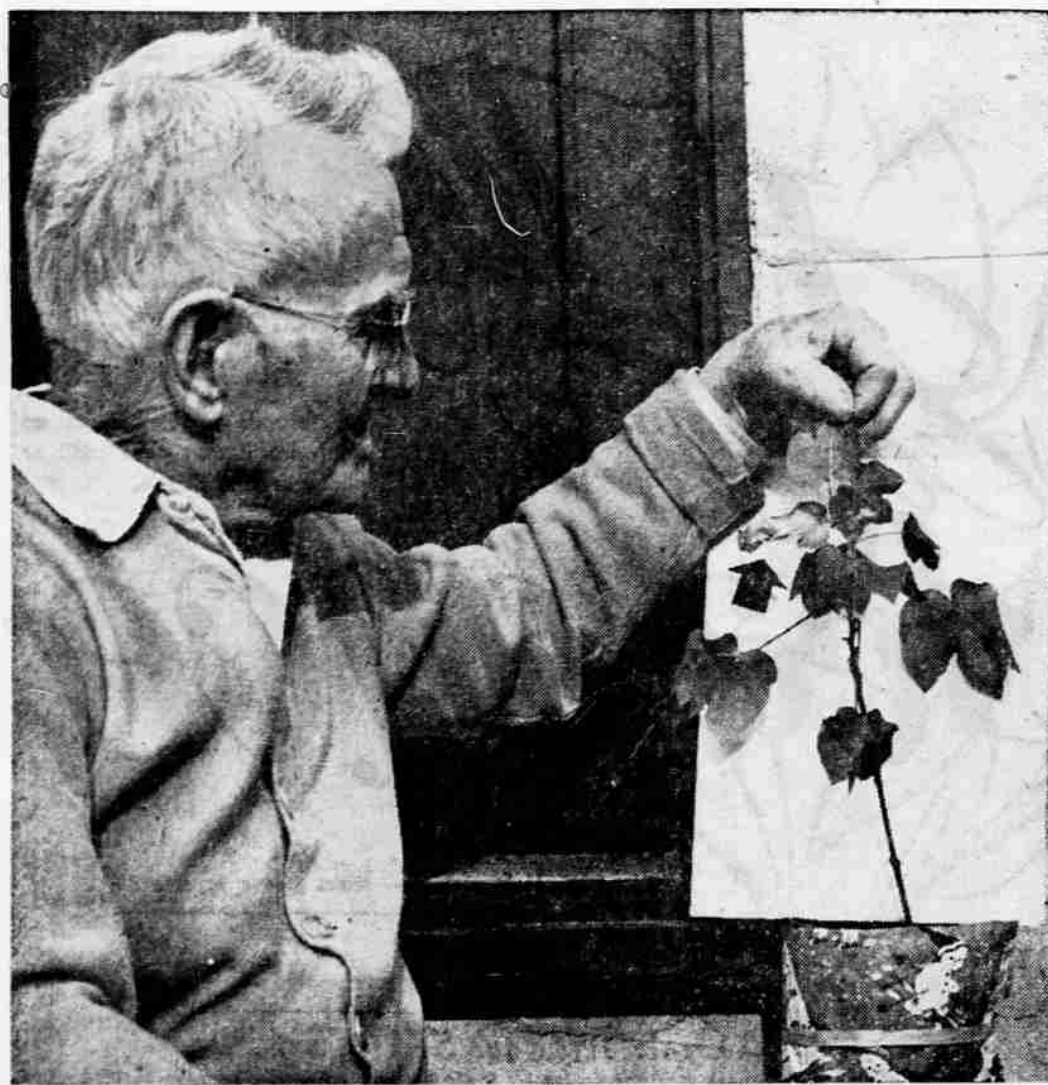




COTTON PLANT—John Gribble, 139 Kenwood ave., Medford, is known to have a way with plants. It was for this reason that a neighbor gave him a cotton seed last fall—to see if he could make it grow. Gribble planted it in a flower pot, and now, some eight months later, he is about to harvest his first cotton crop. The "crop" amounts to one boll

(arrow) which is beginning to swell after losing its white blossom. When mature, the boll will burst, exposing the cotton fiber. The plant, which first came up like a bean, was kept indoors through the winter, according to Gribble, otherwise it never would have survived.

Market Responds To Oil, Steel Reports

New York — (U.P.) — Stocks generated activity and strength today to the accompaniment of favorable reports from several industries, notably oil and steel.

Autos also came into the news when S. E. Knudsen, vice president of General Motors Corp., reiterated his company's earlier prediction of 6,500,000 passenger cars to be produced in 1957. Chrysler got into action late in the day and ran up nearly two points. Other motors held about steady.

Bethlehem Steel, most active stock, ran up a point and U.S. Steel gained more than a point when the president of Youngstown Sheet & Tube told his stockholders the decline in steel operations would be short lived. Youngstown ran up more than two points. Lukens Steel, the star for many a day, hit a new high at 99 1/2 up 6 1/4 points and held most of it.
