Car Smacks Truck; Two Teen-Agers Die

Eugene—U.P.—A car carrying four teen-agers crashed into a log truck 45 miles east of here date Monday. Two of the youths were dead and two others were in serious condition.

Richard L. Hornbeck, 17, McKenzie Bridge, was dead on arrival at a hospital. An autopsy was scheduled. Linda Gale McMullen, 15, Vida, died early today in Sacred Heart hospital here.

Linda Bunell, 14, Leaburg, suffered two broken legs and possible internal injuries and Tim Graves, 17, Leaburg, suffered a broken leg and a possible skull fracture.

Police said the accident occurred just west of McKenzie high school. The car carrying the youths collided with a log truck driven by Mitchell C. Carlton of Blue River, who was not hurt.

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
