151 Taxes on Loaf Of Bread, Research Foundation Shows

New York—(U.P.)—The Tax Foundation, a private research organization, said the price of bread has doubled in the past 20 years, reflecting the fact that there are 151 taxes on a single loaf.

The foundation arrived at this total by counting the federal and state taxes paid by a grocer in Indianapolis who sold the bread, the baker, the companies making ingredients going into the loaf and the railroads that hauled the ingredients.

A partial breakdown showed that the grocer paid four federal taxes and the baker, a national firm owning its own trucks, paid eight federal taxes. The grocer and baker also paid 15 state taxes of one sort and another.

A Kansas City flour mill which supplied the baker paid seven federal taxes and eight Missouri state taxes. The railroad that carried the flour to Indianapolis paid five taxes to Uncle Sam and an assortment of taxes to the three states it passed through.

Taxes also were paid by the New Orleans sugar mill, the Chicago salt warehouse and malt plant, the Cincinnati shortening company and the various railroads carrying these ingredients.

"Assuming all these outfits passed along part of their tax burden in prices, there were at least 151 taxes on this single loaf of bread sold by the Indianapolis grocer," the foundation said.

Zoo Officials Ask Advice on Cranes

New Orleans—(U.P.)—Zoo officials called for expert advice today on how to tend the only pair of whooping cranes in captivity and their two precious eggs.

Director George Douglass of Audubon Zoo ordered a 24-hour watch around the flood-lighted wire enclosure that is the home of Josephine and Crisp to make sure the eggs are hatched.

Douglass said a wildlife expert will be brought in to supervise the incubation, which is expected to last about a month.

Last year the long-stemmed birds hatched two eggs, but one chick disappeared, presumably the victim of a predatory bird, and the other died within 47 days.

Workmen Find Box Set In Building in 1858

Newark, N.J.—(U.P.)—Workmen demolishing a building at 490 Broad st. found a small box in a wall on the second floor in which was this not signed "E.D.R.".

"This was put in here to see what will become of it, for fun." The date on the note was July 13, 1858.

The box also contained a description of Newark's celebration on July 4, 1858, three firecrackers of the kind used in the celebration, and an account of Fourth of July services in a local church.

Larsen has been junior varsity basketball and baseball coach this school year. He had previous teaching and coaching experience in Idaho.

Shark Bites Young Swimmer in Florida

Ormond Beach, Fla.—(U.P.)—Michael Carpenter, 17, was severely bitten on the left leg by a shark Monday while swimming some 75 yards from shore north of here.

The boy, vacationing here with his parents from Monterey Park, Calif., was pulled from the surf by a lifeguard and rushed to the Ormond Beach Osteopathic Hospital. He was listed in fair condition.

Lifeguard Gordon Foote said Carpenter told him he saw the dorsal fin, body and open mouth of the shark before it struck him. The boy estimated the fish was about 13 feet long.

The muscles, bones and tendons of the youth's left leg above the ankle were mangled, doctors said. They said the boy lost a lot of blood.
