

Norblad Newest Hero of 'Drys' On Capitol Hill

Washington—(U.P.)—The "drys" have seized on a new Capitol Hill hero in the person of Rep. Walter Norblad.

But the Oregon Republican said Monday he doesn't intend to assume the role of a temperance champion.

Norblad, a member of the House Armed Services committee, kicked up a fuss last September about the Army allowing teen-aged recruits to buy beer on its posts.

His one-man fight was climaxed by a Pentagon order in February reminding post commanders that beer should not be sold to trainees who are between 17 and 18½ years old.

Norblad estimated he has received more than a thousand letters of congratulations. They come from all sections of the country and the volume rivals the stacks of "cut-the-budget" letters he gets from his own district, he said.

"Now we praise God for men like you who recognize the awful evil of strong drink," a Kingsville, Ohio, woman wrote. Another woman from Miami Springs, Fla., said Norblad's campaign would help insure that military men have "clear heads."

Others begged Norblad to go a step further and have liquor completely banned from military posts.

But Norblad said he has made his point and doesn't plan to press the matter any further unless evidence turns up that the Army order against serving beer to younger trainees is being violated.

Reuther Would Eject Teamsters

Washington—(U.P.)—AFL-CIO Vice President Walter Reuther has advised kicking the Teamsters Union out of the AFL-CIO if the Teamster organization is not cleaned up.

Reuther, also head of the United Auto Workers, said the AFL-CIO should give "decent elements" within the Teamsters an opportunity to clean house.

If this is not done, he said, the Teamsters should be expelled from the parent organization and a rival union created to embrace non-corrupt rank and file members.

He said Teamster President Dave Beck's admission that he borrowed some \$300,000 of Teamster funds for personal use "makes him unfit to hold a position of leadership in the labor movement."

"The AFL-CIO will not compromise with corruption," Reuther said.

Reuther said Sunday that the AFL-CIO had "very sound and firm" grounds as stipulated in the AFL-CIO constitution for bringing corruption charges against Beck and the union.

He rejected Beck's contention that the AFL-CIO Executive Council did not have the authority to suspend him and to order both him and his union to stand trial before the AFL-CIO.

Armory Sewer Line Completed Friday

Construction of the 1,780-foot eight inch sanitary sewer line for the new \$400,000 National Guard armory was completed Friday afternoon, according to Vern Thorpe, public works director.

The sewer line was constructed by M. C. Lininger and Sons, Medford. Cost of the project was about \$4,787.75, Thorpe said.

The sewer extends from the armory site to a connection with the South Bear Creek Sanitary district's trunk sewer line, he said. The Oregon military department authorized the city to act as contracting agent for the sewer line. The state assumes cost of the project. Construction of the armory is nearing completion.

Newsman Named in Third Indictment

Portland—(U.P.)—Oregon Journal reporter Brad Williams was served Monday with an indictment charging him with conspiracy to violate Oregon's wire tap law.

It was the third indictment returned against the newsman by the vice probing Multnomah county grand jury. He had previously been charged with another wire tap violation and with malicious procurement of a search warrant.

All three charges were based on a raid last May 18 on the home of Raymond F. Clark in which five reels of tape recordings were seized. The tapes later were the basis for federal wire tap charges against Clark and his employer, racketeer James B. Elkins.

Williams posted \$1000 bail on the new charge, bringing to \$7000 the total bail he has put up on all three charges.

Tennessee Man Sucked Out of Airplane Window

Istanbul, Turkey—(U.P.)—Jack R. Nash, 32, of Memphis, Tenn., plummeted to death when the window of a pressurized French airliner blew out 18,000 feet above the wastes of northern Iraq.

A power dive to low altitude preserved the other passengers in the Istanbul-bound plane from injury in the sub-zero upper air.

Head Against Window

Nash was sleeping with his head against the window of the U.S.-built Super-G Constellation when the glass gave way 25 miles south of the Iraq "oil capital" of Kirkuk. The rush of air out of the pressurized cabin sucked him with it into the icy stratosphere.

The window blew out with a shattering crash, and the 40-below zero temperature of the outer air caused a dense fog in the 70-degree warmth of the cabin.

In the excitement, no one noticed immediately that Nash was missing. His seat-mate was in the washroom when the window failed.

"We discovered that Mr. Nash was missing only afterwards," the stewardess told investigators here.

Delivery of MID Water Due Soon

The Medford Irrigation district will begin servicing members with water the latter part of this week, according to Manager Jack Hoffbuhr.

The canal was opened last week, and most of the week was devoted to flushing it out after being empty all winter. Water is expected to arrive in the district proper this evening, and for the next few days the lateral delivery canals will be cleaned and flushed Hoffbuhr said. Water users can have water late in the week if needed, he said.

Most of the valley soils are still wet, but a few users on the east side of the district will need irrigation water soon, Hoffbuhr reported.

Delivery of water is later than usual this year, the manager indicated, because of heavy precipitation so far this season. Hoffbuhr said he expected it to be a "fair to middling" irrigation water year, with supplies ample during the first part of the irrigation year, but possibly some curtailment near the end.
