

Ted Williams Plus Errorless Play Aid Red Sox In Opening Days of Campaign

It figures to be another long summer for Boston Red Sox fans, but at least they were able to rejoice today over Ted Williams' fast getaway and the surprising errorless ball being played by their heroes.

Williams hit his second homer of the new campaign Tuesday in leading the Red Sox to a 3-1 victory over the Baltimore Orioles. He also added a run-scoring single—the 2,200th hit of his major league career—to raise his batting average to .423.

However, equally important to all Boston rooters is that the Red Sox stand out as the only errorless team in the majors after the first eight days of the season. Last year they wound up at the bottom of the American league team fielding averages with 169 errors in 135 games.

Sullivan The Winner

In Tuesday's game against the Orioles, the Boston infield handled 35 chances flawlessly. Backed up by this stout defense and Williams' hitting, Frank Sullivan easily posted his first victory of the season. The towering right-hander allowed only four hits, including a ninth inning homer by George Kell that saved the Orioles from a shut-out.

While the Red Sox were protecting their errorless streak, the Chicago Cubs beat Milwaukee, 3-2 in 10 innings to drop the Braves into a first place tie with the idle Brooklyn Dodgers in the National league. Dick Littlefield, the third of four Chicago pitchers, picked up his first victory since being obtained from the New York Giants last week while Lew Burdette was the loser.

Herb Score pitched the Cleveland Indians to a four-hit, 5-0 triumph over the Chicago White Sox. The Tribe chased Billy Pierce in the third after piling up seven hits and a 3-0 lead. In avenging his opening day loss to Pierce and the White Sox, Score struck out seven and only walked two.

Bookie Hurls Three-Hitter

The New York Yankees missed a chance to take over first place from the White Sox by dropping a 3-1 decision to the Washington Senators. The Nats tied the score at 1-1 in the eighth and then won the game on Roy Sievers' two-run, two-out homer in the ninth off Johnny Kucks.

A similar last inning clout by Lou Skizas carried the Kansas City Athletics to a 5-4 squeaker

over the Detroit Tigers. Harry Simpson and Bob Serv also homered for the A's off rookie Don Lee, who was making his major league debut.

Rewarded with a surprise starting assignment by manager Bill Rigney, rookie Pete Burnside showed his appreciation by hurling the Giants to a three-hit, 1-0 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates. A double by Willie Mays and Hank Sauer's single in the fourth inning proved the difference.

Pinch-hitter Bob Thurman's two-run homer in the 10th inning gave the Cincinnati Reds a 6-4 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals in a night game. Frank Robinson and George Crowe also homered for the Reds.

Harry Dorish Records Third Victory in PCL

Harry Dorish, the 33-year-old plumber who has been pitching for the Boston Red Sox, did not leave his tools behind when he moved out to the Pacific Coast league.

Dorish, strictly a reliever in recent years, has started three games for the San Francisco Seals and he has finished what he started each time. As the result he is the only PCL hurler with a 3-0 record. And in addition, Dorish has given up only one earned run this year for a .033 earned run average.

Tuesday night Dorish pitched the Seals to within a game of the top of the pile when he beat Vancouver 3-1.

In other action Seattle scored a run in the ninth to beat San Diego 3-2, while Hollywood got the winning run in the eighth in a 4-3 win over Portland. Sacramento just got too many runs too often and dumped Los Angeles 7-2.

The only run Dorish allowed league leading Vancouver Mounties was an unearned one that tied things up in the sixth inning. But the Seals also had to help some defensive mishaps to help them win. Two Mountie bobbles in the eighth gave the Seals the winning runs and sent George Bamberger down to defeat.

Ray Orteig, Seattle catcher, grounded out after three singles had filled the bases in the top of the ninth to allow Jim Dyck to score the winning run against the Padres. Bill Kennedy took the win and Dolan Nichols, the third San Diego pitcher, was the loser.

Carlos Bernier, shifted from the outfield to third base, came through with three singles for the Hollywood Stars as they broke a five-game losing streak at the expense of Portland.

The final one of the singles drove home the run that broke a 3-3 tie in the eighth and let reliever Ben Wade take the decision from Bob Anderson, the fourth Portland pitcher.

It was the first game this year in which publicized rookie Dick Stuart had not registered a strikeout for Hollywood. Cloyd Boyer did the pitching and the batter for Sacramento

as Los Angeles took it on the chin. Boyer allowed only five hits and was in trouble in only one inning. That was the frame in which Jim Baxes cracked a home run with a mate on base.

Jerry Streeter also had a two-run homer but Boyer's bat accounted for three runs as he hit a double, triple and single in his own cause.
