

# Hunting and Fishing Southern Oregon

With the opening day of trout season within easy casting distance, the anglers are really coming out of hibernation. The repair departments of the many fishing emporiums in the valley are being deluged with rods that need everything from a tip-top to a new one to reels that screech in protest after the long winter.

Weather-wise and road-wise the prospects are pretty good for opening day but of course these can change in a matter of hours. Best lake bets for the opening should be Willow Creek reservoir, Fish Lake, and Squaw lake.

Advance information on these spots indicate that the fishing should be good with Ford fenders and worms heading the list of best baits. Single eggs and worms "dunked" will also take their toll.

**SHOULD PRODUCE WELL**

The waters in all streams in the area are in excellent condition and should produce well. Small flash baits with light spinning gear should produce this year as they have in past seasons.

It may not be generally known but the little Spin 'n' Glo which was so deadly for steelhead last season is also an excellent trout getter. Several sportsmen started using these in size 12 and 14 about three years ago for trout and consider them standard equipment now. They can be fished like a lure — casting

## Bob Grim's Relieving Helps Yanks

New York —(U.P.)— Casey Stengel insists his world champion Yankees "haven't had an easy game this season," but Bob Grim's stout relief pitching is doing a lot to make the tough ones easy.

"Grim is pitchin' real good right now," said Stengel in the wake of the Yankees' 3-2 victory over the Baltimore Orioles Wednesday that saw Grim get the victory in relief. "He's about as good right now as he ever was."

That's saying a huge mouthful, even for the glib Stengel, for Grim's best form is mighty good, indeed — it produced a 20-6 record in his rookie season of 1954.

The ex-Marine son of a Brooklyn bartender had a lot of trouble "servin' 'em up" in 1955 because of elbow trouble and still was only fighting back from that ailment last season.

**Sharp at End of '56**

"He was sharp right near the end of last season, looking just about the way he does now," said Stengel. "I wanted to work him into a starting spot in the World Series, but I had four guys who were pitching complete games for me and I had to use them."

Grim's win over the Orioles, which he gained by allowing just one hit during the last two innings, was his second of the season. He's lost one, too, but Stengel is quick to point out, a misplayed fly ball was his downfall in that one against the Red Sox last Sunday.

"Only clean hit off him in that game was a ground ball that just got through the infield," grumbled Casey. "He shoulda won that one, too."

"He's got a real good curve, and a good slider, and he keeps 'em low," Stengel pointed out. "That's tough."

He means it's tough on the rest of the American league. It figures to get a lot tougher if 1954's "Rookie of the Year" turns into 1957's Joe Page.

Central Point — Crater high and Klamath Falls, each fighting to stay in the running for Southern Oregon conference laurels, collide here Friday afternoon in a baseball doublebill.

Two seven inning contests are slated with the first set for 1:30 p.m. Since earlier action billed for the Klamath diamond was rained out, both games will be counted in the league standings.

The Comets and Klamath are now tied for second place in the circuit. Each has a win and a loss. A double win for either would strengthen it tremendously in the bid for loop and district honors.

A double loss for either would virtually eliminate it from the chase. A series split would hurt the cause of both teams but not disastrously.

Fred Herrmann and Wayne Allen probably will handle the pitching for Crater and Darryl Rusth and Mickey Carney for GP.

## Promising Outlook For Good Catches on Trout Season Opening

Portland—(U.P.)—Oregon sports fishermen were greeted today with a promising outlook for good catches when the 1957 trout fishing season opens Saturday in streams and lakes around the state.

The state game commission issued a general summary of fishing conditions for the opening week end while, at the same time, cautioning that high lakes and reservoirs within national forest boundaries in the Cascades do not open until May 25. That includes East and Paulina lakes.

There are a few exceptions, and the following lakes will be open to fishermen Saturday: Detroit reservoir, Lookout Point reservoir, Harriet lake, Fish lake in Zone 2, Umpqua reservoir in Zone 3, Fish lake, Squaw lake and Willow creek reservoir in Zone 4; Blue lake, Suttle lake, Crescent lake, Odel lake, Wickiup reservoir, Rock Creek reservoir and Lake of the Woods.

Larger streams in eastern Oregon are expected to be somewhat swollen and murky and best results are predicted in smaller streams and creeks.

Best outlooks in central Oregon are in the upper Deschutes, Wickiup reservoir, Suttle and Odel lakes, and the Metolius. Suttle lake should be good for early kokanee angling and rainbows.

Hood river should be good, providing the water conditions are right.

Willamette valley streams will be in "fair" shape, according to commission experts. The Willamette river from Eugene to Har-

risburg should be a good bet for lunker cutthroats, some going 20 inches or better.

**Southwest Excellent**

North coast streams were reported all in good condition, including the smaller tributary streams.

Southwest Oregon streams will be in excellent condition even though logging operations stir up some mud on the Umpqua and Rogue tributaries. That, however, was not expected to be bad enough to hinder trout and salmon angling.

The commission said the Chetco looks like a good early hot spot with good prospects in the Smith, Elk, and Millicoma rivers. Best coastal lakes were Mercer, Sutton, Siltcoos, Tahkenitch, and Devils lake where the rainbows are running to 13 inches.

**NORTHWEST:** Several streams recently stocked including Necanicum Big creek, Beaver creek, Clatskanie river, Rock creek, Tillamook area streams; Portland area angling should be good; salmon angling has picked up in Willamette; central Willamette valley streams should be in good shape; Detroit reservoir prospects good; new run of steelhead has entered the Santiam; Eugene area reservoirs stocked; McKenzie area stream conditions good.

**SOUTHWEST:** Lower north fork and upper main Umpqua low and quite clear but salmon scarce; most streams in fair to good condition for trout; Smith river in good shape; prospects good for lakes and streams in lower Umpqua area; south fork Coos river and tributaries and Williams river should be fair to good; ear fork of Coquille river should be good; middle fork muddy.

Rogue watershed streams in excellent shape; fly fishing in riffle area of Rogue should be excellent; major tributaries should be almost as good as the Rogue; Fish lake road out of Butte Falls in good shape; Lake of the Woods open and accessible from Klamath side.

**CENTRAL:** Road into Blue lake closed; Suttle lake roads open; roads open into Wickiup reservoir; Deschutes river level behind Bend is low and in good condition; Warm Springs area of Deschutes in good shape for trout; roads into Odel and Crescent lake resorts open; road into Devils lake in Klamath county poor.

**NORTHEAST:** Trout prospects fair in Pendleton area with Walla Walla, upper Umatilla and north fork of John Day best prospects; McKay reservoir muddy; tributaries in Wallowa county in good condition; Wallowa lake should be good; Imnaha river high but fairly clear; upper Grande Ronde and upper Catherine creek fairly clear; main Grande Ronde muddy; roads good; Unity reservoir in Baker county good prospect; ice breaking up on Magone lake; road conditions in John Day area only fair.

**SOUTHEAST:** Prospects appear fair to good; Malheur reservoir should be good barring unforeseen storms; Blitzen river; tributaries in Harney county high and roily and expected to be poor; Delintment lake open but trout probably lost by winter kill; Warm Springs reservoir should be fair for trout; Sluicres river high; Ana reservoir has not been stocked and probably will be poor.
