No Radio Contact With Mayflower II

London—(U.P.)—There has been no radio contact with the Mayflower II from this side of the Atlantic in nearly 24 hours, monitors reported today.

The last contact was Wednesday afternoon when Capt. Alan Villiers reported he would have to abandon the original Pilgrim Fathers' route because of unfavorable winds. The ship was 300 miles at sea.

He said he would change the course to the southern route and could not reach Cape Cod until the first week in June.

Kerr Says Ike's Staff Running Government

Washington—(U.P.)—Sen. Robert S. Kerr (D-Okla.) charged Wednesday night that President Eisenhower's staff "practically runs the government."

"Even the news is doctored out to him in 'capsule form,'" he said in his weekly newsletter to constituents.

"It was learned recently that Ike's principal source of current information is a miniature daily of news briefs, edited and selected for him by—of course—his White House staff."

Kerr, who has been one of Eisenhower's most frequent critics, said many Republicans feel they are "getting the bum's rush" when they try to deal with the White House.
