City Files Suit to Condemn Property

The city of Medford filed a complaint for property condemnation in circuit court yesterday against Marshall M. and Betty Day, Biddle lane, Medford.

Mr. and Mrs. Day are owners of property needed by the city for expansion of the Medford municipal airport, according to the complaint.

In addition to condemnation of the property, the city is asking that just compensation for the taking be ascertained and awarded by the court.

The city council on April 2 approved condemnation procedure against the Days. It was explained the property was necessary for a clear zone on the north approach of the primary runway at the airport.

Appraisals submitted from the Medford Realty board for the city established a price of \$18,000 for the land and improvements. Day also had his property appraised from which a price of \$31,380 was established.

Legislature Briefs

Salem—(U.P.)—Gov. Robert D. Holmes signed Senate Bill 253, liberalizing war veterans' entitlement to state educational aid benefits.

The amendment removes the current requirements that Korean veterans must have served in the Korean theater during the conflict there in order to receive state educational aid. It also reduces from six to three months the period of active duty needed to qualify for the benefit, making this requirement conform with other state and federal benefits.

Salem—(U.P.)—The House defeated 31-27 a bill that would have removed the requirement that consent for a blood-alcohol test be written. The test is used to determine the drunkenness of drivers.

Rep. Berkely Lent, Portland Republican, argued that the provision that consent be in writing was valuable and should be retained as a personal protection. House bill 632 would have required only oral consent to the test.

Salem—(U.P.)—A \$1,100,000 budget requested by the Oregon Centennial Commission was discussed before a joint ways and means subcommittee here today and the subcommittee agreed to ask for not less than \$850,000 to celebrate Oregon's 100th birthday in 1959.

Salem—(U.P.)—The Oregon House defeated 34-24 a proposal to allow teachers to serve in the state legislature by constitutional amendment.

Salem—(U.P.)—The House passed Senate Joint Resolution 4 which provides for a vote of the people in 1958 to change the constitution to include the newly approved boundary agreement between Oregon and Washington passed earlier this session. The boundary compact must be ratified by the U.S. Congress.

Salem—(U.P.)—Despite some objections, the House passed a Senate resolution calling for a vote on raising the bonding limit of Oregon from 4 to 6 per cent of the total valuation of the state. Rep. William Grenfell Jr., Portland Democrat, said the bonds would finance increases in veterans farm and home loans approved by the current Legislature.

Bids on New Ashland Clinic To Be Opened

Ashland—Plans for a new clinic building here for Drs. R. W. Bradshaw and R. M. Turner have been requested by seven contractors. Bids will be opened in Dr. Turner's office in Ashland at 2 p.m. April 29.

The clinic will consist of three separate buildings connected by

covered walks. There will be two doctor's suites, each containing 1,024 square feet, and a 572-square foot laboratory building. Construction will be of wood frame with concrete slab on wood floor joints, built up roof, and wood sash and doors. Floors will be covered with composition tile, walls will be wood fiber plaster or wood paneling, and ceilings will be finished with acoustical plaster.
