Hearing Serves to Illustrate Famous Political Maxim

Washington — A congressional hearing featuring former Gov. Arthur B. Langlie of Washington state and Oregon Rep. Charles O. Porter served to illustrate the old political maxim, "It all depends upon whose ox is being gored."

Langlie came down from New York where he is now working as president of a magazine publishing house, to testify before the House Post Office committee on the proposed postal rate increase bill. Porter, as a freshman congressman, is on that committee.

As a governor, Langlie made a reputation for budget prudence at Olympia, generally opposing schemes which involved government subsidy of various projects or services. But as a magazine publisher, Langlie turned up with somewhat different ideas when it comes to how much the government's postal service should cost. As he told the committee:

"What I am anxious to point out to this committee is simply this: that as a public official when this matter first came up I was in complete sympathy with the proposals made here. During the period that I have been working in this business I have tried thoroughly to understand what this would mean to the magazine industry. I am personally convinced after seeing the other side of the picture that the magazine industry today is in a most difficult position to absorb very many additional costs in this field without doing some serious damage to it."

He said the McCall corp., publisher of McCall's and Redbook, had net profit last year of \$730,000, after paying a \$1,300,000 postal bill.

Congressman Porter jumped in to point out that Postmaster General Arthur Summerfield had supplied a report which showed that in 1955 the Post Office calculated it cost more than twice what McCall's paid in postage to mail out its magazines, which number some 90 million copies annually. McCall's paid \$1,097,000, and Summerfield said the postal service cost the government \$2,804,000.

Bear Fair Share
It was also pointed out that Treasury Secretary George Humphrey had urged increase in postal rates by telling the committee: "We must all bear our fair share of the load if we are to keep the federal budget down within reasonable bounds."

We cannot further justify dodging the cost of mail deliveries and passing it on to our children. That is what we do when we fail to put the post office on a pay-as-you-go basis. The postal deficit which has averaged nearly half a billion dollars annually over the past decade had necessarily been added each year to the public debt."

Langlie disagreed that his company wasn't paying its own way.

able amounts rather than changing "exceedingly high military costs that would be along with the sacrifice of American boys in Europe in an unnecessary war."

Morse said in a radio broadcast prepared for northwestern stations that "I am satisfied that when the people come to understand that, they will support those of us who will vote this year for reasonable foreign aid."

Misstatements

Morse, a member of the Senate Foreign Relations committee, denounced "misstatements" about foreign aid during the current economy wave. He said he felt that "history will show that American intervention with financial help in eastern Europe and the middle east after World War II was decisive in halting Communist expansion into those poverty-ridden areas."

The Oregon senator said he would work toward changing the economic aid program "into primarily a loan program, reducing the grants to a minimum."

But Sen. Allen J. Ellender (D-La.) a persistent critic of the foreign aid program, renewed his attacks in his weekly radio broadcast for a Louisiana station. He said President Eisenhower's fiscal 1958 foreign aid program of four billion dollars should at least be cut in half.

Good Opportunity

Morse said the U.S. has a good opportunity in the cold war to demonstrate its good faith by following through on a proposed
