The assurance that the British government would be notified of the invitation has been received by Sen. Richard Neuberger (D-Ore.) from Robert C. Hill, assistant secretary of state, along with an endorsement of the invitation.

Replying to the Oregon senator, Hill noted that the "invitation to Her Majesty and His Royal Highness has not been officially extended," and that "no time has been set for the visit."

Many invitations already extended the queen it would be impossible for "Her Majesty" to fulfill them all.

"However, every possible consideration will be given to include the Oregon Shakespearean festival if the tour materializes," Hill said.
