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Beck To Appear At Union Hearing To Answer Charges

Washington—(U.P.)—Teamsters President Dave Beck agreed today to appear at an AFL-CIO hearing next Monday to answer charges that the Teamsters Union is dominated by corrupt influences.

Beck made known his plans in a letter to President George Meany and to A. J. Hayes, chairman of the AFL-CIO Ethical Practices Committee which is conducting the investigation.

Beck said the union's 13-man Executive Board will attend the hearing "to determine if our rights... will be accorded recognition by your committee, and without prejudice to such rights."

Question Up In Air

The question of whether the union would boycott the hearing had been up in the air since mid-April when the union's Executive Board declared that it would not attend any hearing until certain "rights" had been assured.

Meany and Hayes, in reply, simply told the teamsters that the hearing would be held in compliance with the AFL-CIO constitution.

The "rights" demanded by the teamsters Executive Board called for specific written charges against the union, the right "to confront accusers," the right to "cross-examine those who support the charges," the right to "submit evidence in defense," and the "right to adjudication by a tribunal which has not prejudged the case."

Columbia Fishermen Get Good Salmon Run

Portland—(U.P.)—Columbia river fishermen reported today they had apparently intercepted a fair salmon run on the first day of the commercial gillnetting season.

First night's landing in the Corbett drift averaged about 500 pounds.

Astoria canneries, now free of a strike threat, did not post salmon prices but were ready to compete with the fresh fish market. Upriver independent buyers were offering as high as 35 cents a pound.

Strong winds hampered fishermen last night, running the boats onto the nets.

New York—(U.P.)—The stock market climbed today and industrials reached a new top since Jan. 4 and utilities set a new 26-year high.

Gains in the oils ran to more than four points to the high in Amerasia. Gulf rose more than two points. Others rose one to two points with several at new highs for the year. Superior of California reached a new high at 1.730 up 45 points at its best. Texas Gulf Producing ran up after selling off more than three points.

A rise to a record high in first quarter earnings sustained U.S. Steel. Bethlehem firmed. Lukens rose more than two and then met profit taking.

School Bill Under House Group Study

Washington—(U.P.)—The House Labor committee began work today on a compromise \$2 billion school construction bill.

Chairman Graham A. Barden (D-N.C.) said he would call the committee together daily, Monday through Saturday, until it acts on the proposal.

The measure, drafted by a subcommittee, is a compromise between President Eisenhower's \$1,300,000,000 four-year construction bill and a \$3,600,000,000 substitute sponsored by House Democrats.

Committee approval was expected, but the measure's fate is uncertain in the House itself. And the whole concept of federal aid to school construction faced a new formidable foe in the Senate.

Senate Republican Leader William F. Knowland of California has said any emergency school aid program would be permanent and he will oppose it.

FCC Chairman May Quit Post June 30

Washington—(U.P.)—Informed sources said today Chairman George C. McConaughy probably will vacate his post with the Federal Communications Commission when his term expires June 30.

McConaughy has not announced his plans. Some time ago he revealed that he had been offered reappointment by the White House.

The word among his friends and associates here is that McConaughy is making plans to return to his law practice in Columbus, Ohio.

Lyle C. Newcomer, a Los Angeles attorney who was co-chairman of Sen. Thomas Kuchel's 1956 campaign, has been mentioned as a possible appointee to fill the vacancy.

If McConaughy steps down, President Eisenhower is expected to tap one of the three Republicans on the commission for the chairmanship. They are Rosel H. Hyde of Idaho, John C. Doerfer of Wisconsin and Robert E. Lee of Illinois.
