

Key District Bill Re-Referred To House Education Committee

Salem—(U.P.)—A compromise key district bill containing amendments supplied by Rep. John Mosser, Portland Republican, was re-referred by the House to the committee on education late Wednesday by a 30-27 vote.

The House debated more than an hour and a half before returning the bill on a motion by Rep. Herman Chindgren, Molalla Republican. Chindgren said he favored a compromise key district plan, but wanted the House Education Committee to consider changes in the compromise formula supplied by Mosser.

Bill Changes Formula
The key district bill changes the formula for distributing basic aid to Oregon's school districts. Extensive changes were made in the bill by the House Education Committee from the form in which the bill passed the Senate.

Senate Committee OK's Scott McLeod

Washington—(U.P.)—The Senate Foreign Relations Committee today voted 9-6 to approve the controversial nomination of Scott McLeod as ambassador to Ireland.

Six Democrats voted against the State Department security chief, according to members who left the closed door session early.

McLeod was supported by all seven Republican committee members and Democratic Sens. Mike Mansfield (Mont.) and Russell B. Long (La.), it was reported.

The committee voted to send the controversial nomination to the Senate floor for confirmation after defeating, 9-6, a motion to postpone action.

Voting against McLeod, it was reported, were Chairman Theodore Francis Green (D-R.I.) and Democratic Sens. J. William Fulbright (Ark.), John J. Sparkman (Ala.), Hubert H. Humphrey (Minn.), Wayne L. Morse (Ore.), and John F. Kennedy (Mass.).

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Role of Principals Of Discipline Told By Pakistan Man

Role of the principals of faith, unity and discipline in the government and life of the Pakistan republic were told to Medford Kiwanis club members yesterday in a talk by Capt. M. Yasin Raja, Pakistan Army officer, who is currently a track assistant at University of Oregon.

The captain brought out to Kiwanians that the basic needs and principals of his country and the United States are the same and that much is being gained by both nations from the exchange of students and teachers. He mentioned similarities in the governments of the two countries and in the Christian and Mohammedan religions and stressed the close tie of religion with government in Pakistan.

Spiritual Value

Raja's talk pointed out the importance of spiritual values and declared that with the atom and hydrogen bombs threatening destruction of humanity, this is a time Americans ought to practice Christian beliefs. He said that it was his observation that people in this country want to go to church but are "bashful" and do not want to be called churchmen.

The speaker said that Mohammedanism grew out of the belief that God created humanity for living and not for destruction. He said that Islam has the same principals as Christianity, charity, humanity and faith and stated that the Mohammedans of his country believe in a "faith that can move mountains."

Captain Raja, who has been working with Coach Bill Bowerman at University of Oregon, visited Coach Bob Newland at Medford High school on Tuesday, was introduced to the trackmen, witnessed a junior high track meet and helped with the timing of Medford high athletes who were working out. He expressed considerable enjoyment concerning the visit and was particularly interested in seeing fathers watching their sons perform. "I wish to see that in my own country," he said.

New Ranger Named At Union Creek

Transfer and promotion of Rexford A. Resler to district ranger of the Union Creek district, Rogue River National Forest, has been announced by Supervisor J. H. Wood. The new ranger comes from the Siuslaw Forest, Corvallis, where he has served since 1953.

Resler received a bachelor of science degree in forestry from Oregon State college where he won a scholarship for advanced study. He earned a master's degree in forest management with a minor in forest engineering in 1954.

He received a junior forester appointment on the Siuslaw Forest in 1953 and served as resident project forester on the Marys Peak watershed area for two years before being promoted to the ranger position on a newly formed ranger district in that location in 1955.

Resler had previous experience on the Ochoco National Forest and with private logging companies. He is a member of the Society of American Foresters and also is associated with two national scholastic honoraries.

He is currently president of the Oregon State College Foresters' Alumni Association. Resler is married and both he and Mrs. Resler are active members of the Benton County Sheriff's posse. The couple will report to Union Creek about May 20.

Stedman Returns from Portland Hospital

Robert Stedman, Medford High school English and drama instructor, who has been recovering from a long illness at Veterans hospital, Portland, returned to Medford last Friday. He was transported by Mercy Flights, Inc.

Stedman became ill last October and was taken to the Portland hospital later. While there he has undergone a series of operations.

Mrs. Stedman said he is "improving satisfactorily" and will return to Veterans hospital for an examination in about 30 days. She added that the length of time he will be kept at the hospital will depend on his condition.

During Stedman's illness community groups organized a committee to accept donations that were contributed toward his hospital expenses. In March two "Salute to Stedman" shows were held at Medford High school. About \$1,200 in proceeds from the shows were presented to the Stedman family.
