Former County Man Dies in Seattle

Seattle, Wash.—Albert H. Banwell, 65, who at one time active in Jackson county civic groups, died in a hospital here March 15. He had been failing in health since October, 1955.

Mr. Banwell was managing director of the Medford and Jackson County Chambers of Commerce from 1933 until 1940. He also was a sheriff's deputy in Jackson county, and headed several Jackson county and Oregon civic organizations.

Mr. Banwell formerly was a chief purser for the Alaska Steamship company. He served aboard several ships in Pacific battle zones during World War II.

He was a native of England and came to this country in 1919. He was an organized and first president of the American League of British War Veterans in San Francisco.

Survivors include his wife, LaVila; a daughter, Mrs. Patricia Miller, Seattle; a son, Brent Banwell, in California; five sisters in England, and three grandchildren.
