

Calumet's Iron Liege Derby Winner, Gallant Man Second

Louisville, Ky., — (U.P.) — Iron Liege, a Calumet farm beauty, wiped out a week of misery with a brilliant stretch run Saturday as he turned back a bitter late challenge by Gallant Man at Churchill Downs to win the 83rd running of the Kentucky derby by the tip of his nose and give the stable its sixth triumph in America's racing classic.

All week long trainer Jimmy Jones sweated over another Calumet farm horse, Gen. Duke, who was injured in the derby trial Tuesday and was considered the only real hope the stable had in the first of the triple crown races, Saturday morning. Gen. Duke had to be scratched from the race.

However, just as it has so many times in the past, Calumet farm had another colt ready to roar when its star was knocked out. And so Iron Liege did as Ralph Lowe's Gallant Man charged at him in the stretch.

Hartack Holds On

But jockey champ Bill Hartack, beaten out of the Kentucky derby a year ago when Needles ran down Fabius in the stretch, held on to the lead all the way this time, although it had all but disappeared as he streaked across the finish line.

Gallant Man, nosed out of the Wood Memorial two weeks ago by Wheatley stable's Bold Ruler, ran his heart out in the stretch. But he had to come from too far back to take the winner's purse of \$107,950. He easily beat Kerr stable's Round Table for the place, charging across the finish line two and three quarters of a length in front of Round Table.

Then came Bold Ruler, favorite of this disappointingly small crowd which braved a cold, windy day to watch the first of the triple crown classics. Jockey Eddie Arcaro rode Bold Ruler and asked him to run on the turn into the home stretch. Bold Ruler tried to rally and for a moment appeared to move up. But he just didn't have the speed and power which carried him to track record triumphs in the Bahamas, the Flamingo and the Wood memorial.

Iron Liege was 8 to 1 and paid \$18.80, \$9.40 and \$6.20 while Gallant Man paid \$5.00 and \$4.00 and Round Table \$4.00 in finishing third.

Lucky Calumet Victory

It was a mighty lucky victory for Calumet, Hartack and Iron Liege.

With Gallant Man inching ahead, Willie Shoemaker thought he had reached the finish line in front. He eased Gallant Man slightly with about 50 yards to go and before he realized his mistake, Iron Liege was across the finish line.

"This son of a gun really can run. I didn't think he could run but he made a monkey out of me," said Hartack. But he needed the error by Shoemaker to get him home.

Ironically, Shoemaker rode in the race as a replacement. John Choquette missed the ride because he was suspended last week and "the shoe" was engaged as a replacement.

"I don't like to switch jockeys in midstretch," trainer Johnny Nerud said earlier in the week when he was forced to make one. He regretted it more than ever Saturday.

Bold Ruler was a tired and thoroughly beaten colt in fourth place, just ahead of Federal Hill. Indian Creek, Mister Jive, Better Bee and Shan Pac finished in that order.

Iron Liege, who turned back the clock to 1949 in the memories of this derby crowd, streaked across the finish line in 2:02 1-5. A record running of the Rose Run had been predicted freely as this was one of the best of times in derby history, but Whirlaway's record of 2:01 2-5 remained on the books, safe by four-fifths of a second.

Jacksonville Trips Talent

Jacksonville—Paced by the hitting of Clyde Smith and pitching of Gary Huener, Jacksonville high won a Jackson County B league baseball game from Talent on Friday. Score was 10 to 2.

Smith socked two triples and a double in four times up for the Redskins while Huener heaved five-hit ball, walked two, hit a batter and struck out seven.

Jacksonville's big frames were the first and fifth with three runs each. Smith's first three batters, singles by Huener and Maurice McIntyre and a walk produced the opening frame tallies. In the fifth Smith's other triple, Joe Hogan's hit and a walk and error allowed the runs.

The Redskins were aided by eight bases on balls.

Snyder was the big hitter for Talent with two for three.

Ed Machen Gets Verdict Over Maxim

Louisville, Ky. — (U.P.) — Unbeaten Eddie Machen, fresh from his 21st straight victory, was heartened today by promoter Jim Norris' assurance he would try to match San Francisco Eddie and Tommy Hurricane Jackson for a heavyweight challengers' battle at Madison Square Garden in July.

Machen, second-ranking contender, showed much improvement Friday night, Kentucky Derby eve, before 3,600 fans in huge Freedom Hall as he whipped Joey Maxim much more impressively than in their first bout last January.

Again 24-year-old Machen of San Francisco won a unanimous 10-round decision over the ancient and flabby ex-light heavyweight champion; but this time in more lopsided fashion. Thirty-five-year-old Joey, who now lives in Miami, appeared on the verge of a kayo at least three times. Machen weighed 190½; Maxim, 189.

Norris hoped to arrange the Jackson-Machen fight, because champion Floyd Patterson is reluctant to defend his crown under Norris' promotion. Meanwhile, Jackson, the top contender, is reluctant to fight for another promoter, even for a shot at the title.

YANKS SNAP WHITE SOX WIN STREAK

Brooklyn On Heels of NL Leaders

The New York Yankees snapped the Chicago White Sox' five-game winning streak Saturday when they made an unearned run stand up for a 3-2 triumph. The victory pulled the second-place Yankees within 1½ games of the pace-setting White Sox in the American league.

The White Sox scored their two runs in the ninth but Tommy Byrne, the third Yankee pitcher, struck out Larry Doby to end the rally.

The Brooklyn Dodgers, given a timely assist by the Pittsburgh Pirates, set the stage for the first "Big" National league series of 1957 when Charley Neal's first Ebbs field homer gave them a 4-2 triumph over the St. Louis Cardinals.

The Dodger triumph, coupled with Pittsburgh's 1-0 victory over Milwaukee, left Brooklyn one game behind the pace-setting Braves going into Sunday's game with the Braves at Ebbs field. The Braves, who lost the 1956 pennant to Brooklyn by one game, play Brooklyn Sunday and Monday night.

Law Gives Two Hits
Vern Law gave Milwaukee Gene Freese's single scored Bill Virdon with the game's only run in the seventh.

In the other National league contests, the Cincinnati Redlegs scored all their runs in the eighth to defeat the New York Giants, 5-2, and the Philadelphia Phillies scored four times in the third en route to a 5-2 victory over the Chicago Cubs. In the other American league day game, Early Wynn pitched the Cleveland Indians to a 5-2 victory over the Boston Red Sox.

The Yankees scored twice in the third en route to a 5-2 victory over the White Sox in the ninth when Tony Kubel and Gil McDougald opened with windblown doubles. Mickey Mantle was intentionally walked and Paul La Palme replaced Jim Wilson as Chicago's pitcher. Yogi Berra popped to Nellie Fox but Bubba Phillips booted Bill Skowron's grounder to allow Kubel to score the winning run.

Lindy McDaniel, Cardinal bonus pitcher, pulled his team even with the Dodgers at 2-2 in the seventh with his first major league homer. But Roy Campanella opened the Dodger ninth with a double and Don Drysdale, who ran for him, moved to third on Don Zimmerman's sacrifice. Neal then hit his first Ebbs field homer to win the game.

The Indians got only four hits but bunched three of them in the sixth to score their fourth straight victory. Dean Stone, making his first start for the Red Sox since they obtained him from the Washington Senators, contributed to his own downfall in that inning when he issued two walks and then played a grounder poorly. Wynn helped his own cause by singling to score two of Cleveland's sixth inning runs.

Rookie Jack Sanford pitched a four-hitter for his third straight victory as the Phillies handed the Cubs their ninth straight defeat. Sanford now has four straight and is undefeated in a major league play since coming out of the service to join the Phillies late last season.

Art Schult's two-run double highlighted Cincinnati's big eighth inning after left-hander Johnny Antonelli held them to three hits until that inning. Warren Hacker was credited with his second 1957 victory although he was relieved by Hersh Freeman in the eighth.
