Washington—(U.P.)—A timely tip for June brides and grooms: Have your honeymoon right in your own home.

Here are just some of the advantages listed by Dr. John R. Cavanagh, noted psychiatrist: —Less chance of getting tired. —Less chance of getting bored.

—It's cheaper, laddie. Cavanagh, lecturer at Catholic and Georgetown universities, told a social hygiene society meeting Monday "The best advice which can be given to most couples concerning the honeymoon is to spend it at home."

He said the honeymoon "may make or break a marriage." But, he said, too often the groom arrives at the altar exhausted after a big bachelors' party the previous night.

Moreover, he said, the bride is probably just as exhausted from the weeks of preparation and parties before the wedding. Cavanagh said then they rush off to "some uncomfortable and expensive hotel" and frequently it's all a "disappointing experience."

He said with both of them in the shape they are in it might be just as well for them to stay home and get a good night's sleep.

Then, he said, during the next few weeks they can get more accustomed to each other in a relaxed atmosphere.

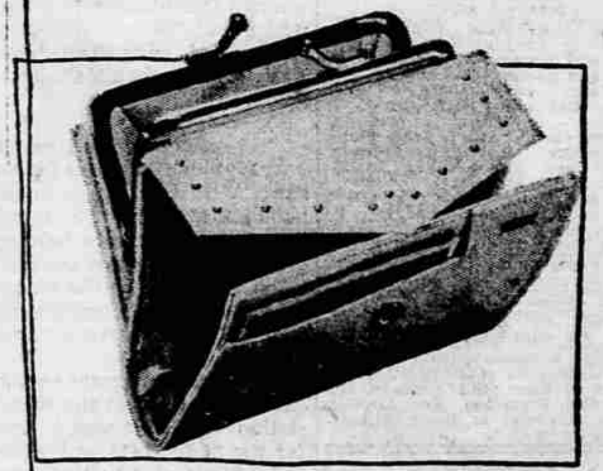
