Overcoming a three-run deficit with a four-run fourth inning, adding an insurance marker in the fifth frame and hanging on for two shaky final frames, the Medford high baseball aggregation nipped Ashland 6 to 5 Friday in a Southern Oregon conference baseball fracas here.

Ashland packed all its scoring into the first two innings to lead the non-league second game of the afternoon doubleheader. Dennis Barr homered with one man on base in the third inning for Medford.

The conference victory pulled the Black Tornado into a second place knot with Crater. Each has a 3-3 record. Ashland went deeper into the cellar with 1-5.

Ortega Given Nod in Bout

Syracuse, N. Y. — (U.P.) — Gaspar Ortega of Mexico may have to wait until next November for the welterweight title shot he earned by again scoring an upset, split decision over Cuba's Isaac Logart in their 12-round "rubber" elimination match Friday night.

Lanky Ortega's second triumph in their three fights won him recognition as top contender for the 147-pound crown in the eyes of the New York State Athletic Commission, at least.

But managing director Harry Markson of the International Boxing club said today: "Perhaps Basilio will postpone his next defense until after he challenges Sugar Ray Robinson for the middleweight title in September."

Twenty-one-year-old Ortega's long-range counter-punching against Logart's close-quarter hooking attack won the votes of Referee Al Berl on a rounds basis 7-4-1 and Judge Harold Barnes, 6-3-1. But Judge Joe Agnello favored Logart, 7-5, as did the United Press, 6-5-1.

Pittsburgh, — (U.P.) — The Pittsburgh Pirates announced Saturday that Dick Stuart, who hit 66 homers in the minors last year, has been sold by the Hollywood Stars of the Pacific Coast League to the Atlanta Crackers of the Southern Association.

Stuart, however, will still be subject to Pirate option.

The loquacious outfielder clouted six home runs for the Pirates in the spring exhibition season. However, his strikeout total rose alarmingly and the Pirates shipped him to their Hollywood farm club before the start of the regular season.

The six-foot, three-inch home run king smashed six homers in the first week and a half of the PCL campaign, but trailed off drastically to a .226 average in 18 games. He had 12 hits and 11 runs batted in for 53 at bats through last Sunday.

Cincinnati Wins Tenth Straight Tilt

The Cincinnati Redlegs scored their 10th straight victory Saturday by edging the Chicago Cubs, 5-4, and tied Milwaukee for the National League lead when the St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Braves, 8-7.

The Redlegs have run up their entire string on the road. Bob Thurman, who walked as a pinch-hitter in the seventh, opened the ninth with his third 1957 homer to enable Cincinnati to down the Cubs at Wrigley Field.

Musial Hits Homer
After second baseman Danny O'Connell and Joe Adcock made errors in the 10th inning, Ken Boyer singled to score Al Dark with the winning run for the Cardinals against the Braves at St. Louis. Boyer, Stan Musial and Wally Moon hit homers for the winners and Hank Aaron hit one for Milwaukee.

In other National League action, the Philadelphia Phillies defeated the Pittsburgh Pirates, 7-2, and Valmy Thomas hit a homer with two out in the 15th to give the New York Yankees a 6-5 victory over the Brooklyn Dodgers.

Al Smith's eighth-inning homer gave the Cleveland Indians a 2-1 victory over the Kansas City Athletics in the only day game played in the American League.

The Phillies provided left-handed Harvey Haddix with six runs in the first inning off Bob Friend and he limited the Pirates to 10 scattered hits while making his 1957 record 2-2. Stan Lopata's three-run homer climaxed Philadelphia's big first inning. It was Philadelphia's fourth straight victory and Pittsburgh's sixth straight defeat.

The Dodgers and Giants played four hours and 59 minutes in a steady rain at the Polo grounds before Thomas hit his first major league homer off Don Bessent. Bessent was the fifth pitcher for the Dodgers, who suffered their fourth straight loss.

Smith's homer at Cleveland gave Bob Lemon his third victory and the Indians their fourth straight triumph since Herb Score, their young left hander, was struck in the eye by a liner off the bat of New York's Gil McDougald last Tuesday night.

Montreal — (U.P.) — Eddie Lopat the former New York Yankee "junkman" now in his sophomore year as manager of the admits he has one goal in mind — succeeding Casey Stengel.

"After all, Case can't go on forever," Lopat pointed out Saturday. "Let's not kid anybody, we managers are in this game for the same thing the players are — the money. And like I tell my players there's no money in Triple A ball."

The 38-year-old New York born Lopat said he is well aware that the Yankees have never hired a manager from their own system, but he added optimistically: "who knows? There's always a first time."

The wavy-haired redhead who won 160 games in 12 major league seasons — eight with the Yanks — feels he is serving a worthwhile and necessary apprenticeship in the International league. Lopat said he's not in any particular hurry, but "willing to work down here for two or three years and see what happens."

Dressen May Take Post
