

Eagle Point District 6 A-2 Track Champ With 91 Tally

Ashland—Eagle Point high, led by Jack Greb and Wayne Christian with five first places among them, won the District 6 A-2 track meet Saturday, compiling 91 points and picking up seven berths in the state contest at Corvallis.

Myrtle Creek was a close second with 86 points and seven state meet positions. Douglas scored 81, Phoenix 50, Sutherlin 41, Glendale 27, Illinois Valley 26, Brookings 18, Henley 9 and Oakland 3. Douglas gained two spots in the state titular tangle. Sutherlin, Glendale and Phoenix each two.

Christian set new standards of 144 feet in the discus and 193 feet 9 inches in the javelin, best prep heave this season in southern Oregon. Greb won the 100 and 220-yard dashes and tied with Wes Young, Glendale, in the high jump.

Cliff Thomson, Douglas, romped away with both the mile and half-mile and had new record times of 4:37.8 and 2:01.9. The Douglas relay team knotted the district mark of 1:39.1.

W. Bartley was victor in both the high and low hurdles for Myrtle Creek.

Douglas had four first places. Myrtle Creek three and Illinois Valley and Phoenix each one.

F. Newton won the broad jump for Douglas, Ken Lockhart the shot put for IV, S. Bennett the pole vault for Myrtle Creek, Charles Swingle the quarter-mile for Phoenix.

Eagle Point finished in front in the relay but was disqualified.

Washington—(U.P.)—Representative Kenneth B. Keating Saturday attacked plans to include boxing in the House anti-trust subcommittee's coming hearings on professional sports.
The New York Republican said it will "confuse" the issues if the subcommittee tries to cover boxing along with professional baseball, football, basketball and hockey.
"It is high time Congress needed boxing into taking some action on its own before it becomes necessary for Congress to clean house for them," Keating said in a statement.

Question of Score's Sight Unanswered

Cleveland—(U.P.)—Doctors once again postponed x-rays of Herb Score's injured eye Saturday and left unanswered for a few more days the question of whether he will regain full vision soon.
"Score continues to improve," Dr. Don Kelly and Dr. Charles Thomas reported in their latest medical bulletin Saturday.
"The hemorrhage... is steadily clearing. There is no longer any swelling around the nose or eye socket," the terse bulletin said.
Despite "encouraging recovery reports," Dr. Thomas, an eye specialist who was called into the case soon after Score was carried from the field, put off until next week a definite diagnosis of the eye injury.
"We hope that within the early part of next week we will be able to make a more accurate evaluation of the extent of injury," the doctors said in a joint statement.

Since last Tuesday, when the 23-year-old Cleveland Indians star was felled by Gil McDougald's line drive, there has been a nagging fear that Score's vision might be impaired enough to bring a halt to his career.
