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## U.S. May Propose Open Sky Plan in Alaska, Siberia

Washington—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles said today the United States may propose to Russia an "open skies" aerial inspection plan covering Siberia and Alaska.

In discussing the possibility of Siberia and Alaska as a limited disarmament test area, Dulles said this is the kind of area that might provide launching sites in an atomic war.

Dulles did not rule out the possibility that a test disarmament inspection zone might also be worked out in part of Europe. But he told a news conference that the problems there are much greater because they involve German unification and other political problems.

**Position Not Reached**  
Dulles emphasized that the U.S. has not yet reached an agreed government position on the aerial inspection zones it will propose in further negotiations with the Soviet Union in London. He said those talks have been considering a whole host of proposals and may now be at the stage where it is advisable for U.S. disarmament negotiator Harold E. Stassen to return to Washington for consultations.

Dulles said that the Russians at long last seem to have agreed with the U.S. that aerial inspection is essential in getting disarmament going. He said the question now is: In what zone should the test area be started.

## Mailmen To Use Motorized Cart

Washington—Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield will put all 27 mailmen in nearby Bethesda, Md., Wednesday aboard motorized three-wheel mailsters costing almost \$1,000 a piece.

Postal officials, plagued by congressional budget-cutting and demands for economy, declined to say whether the gadgets will cost or save the taxpayers money in the long run.

A Post Office Department official spokesman, asked about possible savings, told a reporter, "Presumably we will be pinned down to a point where we will have to show some savings." He noted the news release about the mailsters said they are expected to provide "more economic service."

The Post Office said altogether it has 1,500 mailsters on order. That would be a total cost of close to \$1,500,000.

Apart from cost, the mailsters apparently are the answer to the tired postman's dream.

The three-wheeled vehicle is protected from the weather, has an enclosed carrying area in the rear and is fully equipped with electrical and directional signals and a 7½-horsepower motor.

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**Milk Production Off During April**

Portland—Oregon dairies produced less milk last month than in any other April of record, according to the monthly dairy report issued here today.

The report said production of 105 million pounds was two per cent less than a year earlier.

## Israel Threat Halts Rising Stock Market

New York—An Israeli threat to stop Egypt's blockade against her shipping through the Suez canal halted a rising stock market today.

Selling hit the international oils and then spread throughout the main list of stocks. Many issues managed to move against the trend.

The industrial average again fell back to around the 500 level. Rails joined the decline while utilities rose a bit to a new 26-year high in their average.

## Americans Give Up Claim to Treasure

Manila—An American couple reported to have found a \$50 million sunken treasure has offered to give up all rights to it, the Philippine News Service said Monday.

The same service reported Sunday that Professor Vincent Palmer and his wife, Lucie, had found the treasure in gold bullion while studying marine life in the Sulu sea in the southern Philippines.

The news service said Monday it had received a telegram from the "Washington Masias Scientific Artist Suboceanic Society Expedition" from Bongao, Sulu.

It quoted the Palmers as saying in the telegram: "We have found the Filipinos and Moslems so pleasant and friendly to Americans we offer our rights to three objects your (the news service) dispatch describes as worth \$50 million to the Philippine people."

## Ex-Albany Attorney's Guilty Plea Stands

Portland—Federal Judge William East late Monday denied a motion by Robert McKechnie, 35, former Albany city attorney, to set aside a plea of guilty to a charge of failing to file income tax returns.

Judge East delayed until Wednesday execution of a 60-day sentence he had ordered for McKechnie on request of attorneys for the defendant.

After McKechnie pleaded guilty to the charge he was sentenced but on May 3 Judge East delayed execution of the sentence pending presentation of a motion to withdraw the guilty plea.

McKechnie is the first of some 20 persons who have pleaded guilty to the misdemeanor charge to get a jail sentence instead of probation.

## Test Plans Pressed Despite Japan Protest

Washington—The United States today pressed its plans for new nuclear tests in Nevada despite a Japanese request to call them off.

However, the U.S. promised that the tests will be carried out with utmost safety.

In rejecting the Japanese request, the U.S. noted that Russia has refused to agree to a foolproof arms control plan. The U.S. said "history has repeatedly demonstrated that one-sided weakness leads to war."

The U.S. position was outlined Monday night in a note handed the Japanese Embassy several hours after the Atomic Energy commission issued a statement emphasizing that the Nevada tests will produce less radioactive fallout than any domestic test series since 1952.

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## Beck's Temporary Withdrawal From Office Suggested

Washington—Public relations advisers to the Teamsters Union have recommended that Dave Beck step out of the union's presidency at least temporarily, informed sources said today.

The recommendations were submitted to Teamsters Vice President Elmer Einarson and these sources said, are probably being considered by Mohn and four other vice presidents at a meeting here today.

Tony Smith of the public relations advisers said they made "specific recommendations of what we feel is best for the union from a public relations standpoint." He would not confirm any details.

The recommendations call for Beck to "step aside" until the charges against him and disclosures by the Senate Rackets committee are disposed of or "settled, one way or the other," the sources said.

So far Beck has not backed down from his announced intention to run for reelection at the union's September convention.

But the recommendations submitted today could pave the way for election of a new president at that convention.
