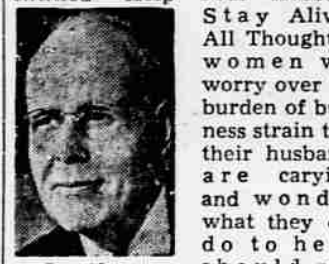
The Medical Roundup

The Need For Showing Love

I have been reading a splendid book by Hannas Lees (Appleton), entitled "Help Your Husband Stay Alive."

All thoughtful women who worry over the burden of business strain that their husbands are carrying, and wonder what they can do to help, should read this book. Mrs. Lees has been concerned over the fact that so many business men die early. In America two middle-aged men die to every one middle-aged woman. Mrs. Lees thinks that men are killing themselves to make a better world for their wife to live in — alone — as a widow! She has wondered what wives can do to help their men live longer and to be happier. In what way is many an American woman failing her husband?

Mrs. Lees asked a psychiatrist who has spent his life studying the war between men and women, and he said the two basic and most unfulfilled needs of men are for more warm sexual love and for more approval and appreciation. As Mrs. Lees says, men rarely get any words of approval or appreciation around the plant, and when they get home they often feel or hear decided disapproval on the part of the wife.

Many a man greatly wants affection but does not get it. I remember an able and prominent and sensitive man who was on the edge of a nervous breakdown. After days of exploration for the causes of this, I learned that although his wife was good to him, she never reached out to touch him with any affection. He said "Doctor, I'd give much of my wealth if sometimes she would hold my hand, or put her arm about my shoulders, or run her hand through my hair, as a loving woman does."

As Mrs. Lees says in her book, thousands of women should be spending more thought and effort on making home a happy refuge for their husband when he comes in at the end of a tiring day. If it is not a comfortable and comforting place to come to, then it is not a home, and some day the man may be going elsewhere in search of peace and some signs of appreciation and affection.

One Great Desire

Yes, I know; the wife may also have had a hard and trying day. She may have had a lonely day by with no one to talk to; by 6 o'clock she may be bursting into talk to someone and to pour into someone's ears her pent-up tale of annoyances. When her husband comes home, tired from talking all day, he has one great desire, which is for quiet and peace, with his pipe, his newspaper, and his supper. Then unless the wife is a very wise and loving woman she is likely to get angry at him for his taciturnity and unwillingness to talk and to amuse her. She will think him terribly selfish and soon perhaps he will be telling him, for the umpteenth time, that if he had done this and so in his business, or if he had made the boss give him an assistant, or if he hadn't wasted so much money on generous salaries and long-distance telephone calls he might be someone in the business world. And so it goes. Night after night the two unfortunate people grow farther apart mentally and spiritually.

Made Fuss Over Him

Mrs. Lees tells of a very proper wife who lost her husband to his 19-year-old secretary. What happened was that the girl was often making a fuss over him and telling him she loved him and admired him. She kept holding his hand "right out in public," and he liked it. As the ex-wife said later, "I don't know how she did it; I couldn't; I wish I could have."

That last statement is the tragic one: "I wish I could have." As I have said in this column, thousands of the persons in this world who crave affection cannot reach out for it, and thousands cannot accept it when it is offered to them. They are too shy or reserved or "touch-me-not." They feel that to hold hands in public is to "make a fool of themselves."

Perhaps the best way in which I can show how many women feel about loving is to quote here an excerpt from a letter written me after I published a column like this on the need for a closer and more beautiful love between husbands and wives. I said love can be the most beautiful thing in the world.

My correspondent wrote "I'm so disgusted with your article on sex in our paper; it is too filthy for words. As I read it, I felt like vomiting. I am now writing to the paper to demand that they quit publishing your rotten articles. You must be a wicked man, and you must have been doing some filthy reading."

How sad! I fear her husband and her children, if she had any, must be living without any sign of love from her. I thank God that I had a father and mother who loved each other and were not ashamed to show it. I thank God that when I was small, my mother loved to cuddle me and call me endearing names.

I remember once watching a very affectionate little girl of eight or so as she jumped up, threw her arms around the neck of her bachelor uncle and kissed him several times. He said, "If I

could ever find a woman who would do that to me, I'd marry her on the spot!"

CROSSWORD PUZZLE

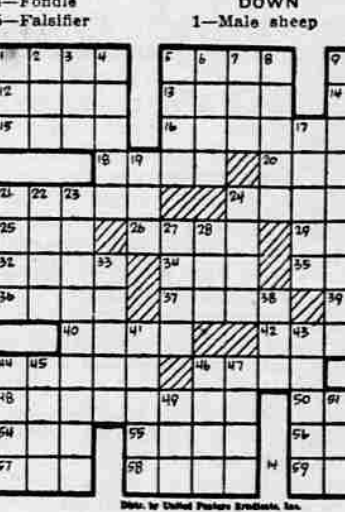
