Miller on Trial on Contempt Charge

Washington — Pulitzer Prize winner Arthur Miller playwright husband of actress Marilyn Monroe, went on trial in district federal court today for refusing to tell Congress names of authors at Communist meetings he attended in 1939.

Marilyn's press agent said she did not plan to attend.

The curvaceous actress was not in the courtroom March 1 when Miller pleaded innocent to contempt of Congress charges and was released on \$1,000 bail.

If convicted, he faces a maximum penalty of two years in prison and \$2,000 fine.

The lanky playwright was cited for contempt last July 25 for refusing to tell the House Committee on Un-American Activities the names of persons who attended meetings of Communist writers. A federal grand jury indicted him for contempt Feb. 18.

During his appearance before the committee last June, Miller testified freely about his own activities. He admitted attending the meetings but said he was never under Communist Party "discipline."

But he refused "on grounds of conscience" to identify persons he saw at the meetings.

Expulsion of Envoy Claimed Retaliation

Berlin — American diplomat Martin S. Bower Jr. said today his expulsion from Russia was "pure retaliation" for the ouster of a Soviet diplomat from the United States.

Bower, Holyoke, Mass., arrived here by train from Moscow today with his wife and two children. He said he believed he would be reassigned to a post in Frankfurt, Germany.

"There is no question but that my ouster was pure retaliation," Bower said. "The grounds on which I was ordered to leave were ridiculous."

He said the Soviets accused him of "being insulting to the Soviet Union with the intent to undermine the social structure."

Bower said "they could make that charge against all foreigners in Moscow and a good many Russians as well."

Korean Teachers Told To Avoid Flashy Clothes

Seoul, Korea — The Ministry of Education today instructed women teachers to avoid flashy clothes and makeup that might "tend to give undesirable stimulation" to young students.

"Don't wear makeup, don't dress colorfully, don't expose too much of the body," the ministry ordered.

Salt Lake City — (U.P.) — Before delivering a copy of the Book of Mormon, left by and unidentified woman for a Salt Lake county jail inmate, jailer Kresh Jurethich thumbed through it, removed a hacksaw blade glued inside the back cover, then followed instructions scribbled on a note: "Please deliver this to Ted Keener and have a talk with him."

Paterson, N. J. — (U.P.) — Matthew Nowosad pleaded innocent to a charge of parking less than 25 feet from a street corner. He insisted he had measured off the distance with a six-foot ruler. But Magistrate Joseph J. De Lucia fined Nowosad five dollars after Nowosad explained that his measurement had been "three and a half lengths" of the ruler. The court decided that was 21 feet.

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Schrunk, Reporter Indictments Rapped

Portland — Indictments returned by the March Multnomah county grand jury against Mayor Terry Schrunk and Oregon Journal reporter Brad Williams came under fire in Circuit court Monday by attorneys for the two men.

Manley B. Strayer, attorney for Williams, challenged Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton to resubmit a group of indictments returned by the March grand jury to a new grand jury. Strayer called the recent grand jury work "a crusade to publicize various defamatory matter."

Edwin D. Hicks, attorney for Schrunk, told the court he approved of Strayer's blistering attack on the grand jury report. He also asked the court for permission to withdraw innocent pleas entered by Schrunk to bribery and perjury charges so that these indictments also could be challenged. Judge Charles Redding postponed a decision.

The indictments under attack Monday charge Schrunk and Williams with illegally obtaining telecommunications. The attorneys are seeking to have them dismissed.

Hicks also indicated he expected to file motions for continuance of Schrunk's first-scheduled trial set for May 22 on the perjury charge.

Governor Plugs for Additional Justices

Salem — The backlog of cases before the State Supreme Court will continue to grow and the judicial rights of the public thwarted unless the Senate receives a bill to increase the number of justices, Gov. Robert D. Holmes asserted Monday.

"I think the Senate will be derelict in its duty to the public if it fails to provide an orderly solution which Senate bill 10 offers," the governor said. He added that it was not a partisan matter.

Senate bill 10, which would increase the seven man court by two members, is currently held in the Senate Judiciary Committee. The committee has substituted a measure to provide two court commissioners to assist the present justices.

Gov. Holmes said both the court and the Oregon Bar Association wanted the increase and have opposed the commissioner

Lane County Judge Bill Passes House

Salem — A bill giving Lane county a second district judge passed the House Monday and was sent to the governor.

Rep. Keith D. Skelton, Eugene Democrat, said the present district judge was handling more than twice as many civil and criminal cases as other district judges.

Skelton said 165 cases were now on the docket and the 1,000 civil cases alone were filed in the first five months of 1956. The new Lane county courthouse will include rooms for two district courts, he added.

Also passing the House and going to the Senate was House bill 563 splitting the second judicial district which includes Lane, Douglas, Coos and Curry counties.

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Swan Island Airport Proposed by Group

Portland — An airport on part of Swan Island was proposed by a citizen's group at the Port of Portland commission meeting Monday.

A three man group pointed out that the war surplus buildings on the former airport are losing their usefulness. Many of them are being removed and industry is not using the space reserved for industrial purposes.

Warren Treece, head of the group, pointed out the need for a close in port and also a heliport. He said the airport would be of great value to businessmen, tourists, and salesmen who are using airplanes in an ever increasing number.
