Refreshments were served by the hostess.

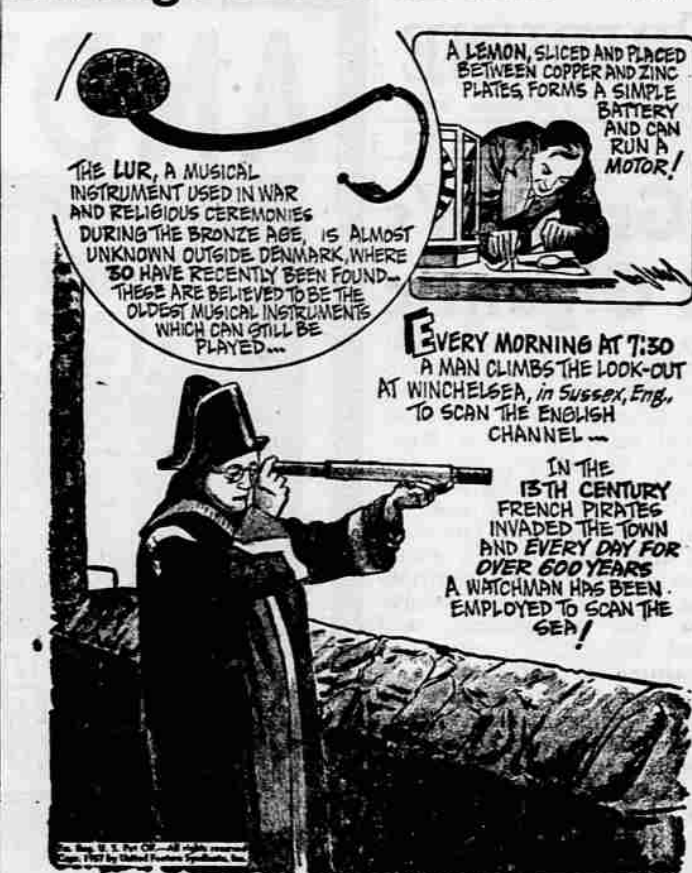
